Church Roof

All Saints Church in Clipston will benefit from £54,000 to address urgent roof repairs. The Parochial Church Council of the Church successfully applied for the grant through the Government funded Listed Places of Worship: Roof Repair Fund. For some time now the Church has been suffering ingress of water whenever it rains due to the roof covering having reached the end of its practical life.

The PCC was unsuccessful in its application to the Roof Fund last year and had to put a temporary tarpaulin over the South aisle roof last December.



Now that it will be possible to replace the roof and make the building water-tight, it is planned to carry out extensive redecoration and improvements to make the building more comfortable and suitable for community activities.

Steve Carpenter, Churchwarden says 'We are delighted to have been successful in this years grant bid. This will encourage us in our attempts to make the Church more welcoming and increasingly to become seen as a community facility'.

Although there were 15 dry days in the month, the total rainfall was almost up to average. Nearly 75% of the 62mm total came in five days, with the highest amount of 12mm on Tuesday 10th. Day mean temperatures were average despite two cold days in the last week when the thermometer failed to rise above 10°C. However, from the 5th to the 9th the maximum temperatures ranged from 20° to 24.5°C. The night mean was a degree above average with no air frost recorded.

June 2016

The month started comparatively dry with only small amounts of rain on five days in the first twelve. Then, on the 13th came heavy rain from the morning into the afternoon amounting to over 25mm. This was nearly a third of the 79mm total for the month, whereas my average for June is 64mm. The remainder of the month was guite wet with only three dry days. Rainfall for the first six months of the year amounts to 455mm -29% above average. The maximum temperature in the month was 24°C in the first week, rather unusual for the June maximum to be lower than that for May. The daytime mean was a degree below average, but the night mean two degrees above.

July 2016

In contrast to the previous months in the year, July was very dry with 15 totally dry days and a rainfall of only 24mm. - a little over a third of average. The rain that did come was in relatively small amounts and light showers, with some overnight only. Temperatures were below average despite a maximum for the year of 31.5°C on Tuesday 19th. Although there was some sunshine on all days but one, it only extended from sunrise to sunset on two occasions.

Clipston Consolidated Charities

When I asked Colin Morley if the Courier could do an article on the Clipston Consolidated Charities, of which he is the Honorary Secretary, little did I know that he would arrive on my doorstep with a 3-inch thick antique-looking book full of minutes dating back to 1872. The history of the charities began in 1831 when Clipston resident and philanthropist, Matthew Brown, left to the village a 15acre field known as the 'Poors' Twantry', for villagers to use as allotments to help the 'poor and needy'. At the same time he left the adjacent 10-acre field to the church. Since then, the two fields have been combined into one 25-acre field and the rent income is apportioned accordingly. The history of 'Poors' Twantry' allotments can be traced back to 1777 when the Enclosure Act for Clipston stipulated that it shall be 'vested in the Rector of Clipston, who will receive the rents and, pay in fuel, corn or apparel to and for the needs of the most necessitous, industrious and honest poor of the parish'.

In addition to the land, Matthew left £673 in New Consols – the 2nd charity and his sister Ann Brown left £97 in 1871 - the 3rd charity. The three charitable offerings were combined in 1902 by the Charity Commission to form the Clipston Consolidated Charities and it is the rent from the 15 acres that today provides the village, each year, with a modest sum to help villagers in need.

The book of minutes is an enlightening historical account of the monies provided to villagers for well over a century and it is fascinating to read how such historical events as the World Wars and the Great Depression affected the amount available each year.

Over the years the charity has benefited adults and youngsters alike but over recent years, with its purpose seemingly becoming less and less well known amongst villagers, it has tended more to help the elderly who know of its existence historically. The current trustees are very keen to spread the word of the Clipston Consolidated Charities to all those in the village, old and young, who may enjoy the benefits of this wonderful village asset. It could be anything from helping with heating bills for the elderly, to buying books for college students or equipment for apprentices between the ages of 16 and 21 years. All applicants must have lived

in the village for at least two years. Applications must be sent in writing to the secretary or treasurer, or initially by

This historic charity, solely for Clipston residents, should and must become common knowledge to all who meet the criteria – we owe it to the Browns' legacy, and the wonderful book of minutes which has been going since 1872, and holds all meeting minutes from this time, still has plenty of empty pages to fill. As Colin Morley says, "there is room for at least another 100 years' worth of minutes in this book"!

Clipston Consolidated Charities

The Trustees will be meeting during the first week of December to distribute charity funds. The charity is only for residents of Clipston, and is applicable as follows;

- 1) Contribution towards travelling expenses of patients to and from hospital
- 2) Contribution towards entering a trade or profession or study as a student for all persons under 21 years of age in further education.
- 3) Relief in sickness for food, fuel or clothing.
- 4) Gifts of money in case of emergency.
- 5) Contribution towards funeral expenses.
- 6) No applicant may receive money entitling them to recurrent benefits.

Applicants wishing to be considered by the Trustees please apply in writing to either the Secretary or Treasurer by no later than the 30th November.

LOTTERY FUNDED

We have been successful with a second Big Lottery application for a grant. We want to widen that attractiveness of the Recreation Field to more people from Clipston. Planting of the

woodland and installation of the play tree will take place in the autumn. This new project is especially relevant given the problems that small local sports clubs are experiencing across the country. Sadly this has now affected Clipston F.C. and following a huge success of promotion to the premier division last season they are now facing a struggle for survival. We wish them the best of luck for the future and hope that they can continue with competitive football in Clipston.

There are also plans to increase the equipment suitable for young people to use. More news hopefully in the autumn.

Fund raising remains essential for us to cover the costs of running the Recreation Field. The street party raised around £1,000. On 26 November Chris Blake will be returning following his successful concert last year. Wormslade Farm: Digester proposal

Despite many objections from Clipston residents, as well as from Arthingworth, Oxenden and other local Parishes, Northants County Council (NCC) Planning Committee was minded by a majority vote on 28th June to accept the planning application to build an anaerobic digester plant covering 13 acres at Wormslade Farm. However on the positive side, some conditions were attached to the approval. Specifically, the approval includes conditions that restricts access through Clipston and other villages. In principle, this means that traffic associated with the development will not impact the safety of the residents and in particular the children attending school and pre-school. Although it is not clear if the conditions are really enforceable, but see final comment below.

Following the Councils decision an application for a Judicial Review was considered, by AOWT (Against Oxenden Wind Turbines) who coordinated and led the objections to the Wormslade Farm digester. The purpose of the Judicial Review effectively was to challenge the Council's handling of the processes and as such, the Judicial Review would had to have demonstrated that the NCC did not act properly, and also that if there was a likelihood that had they done so, the decision would be have been different. However, on consideration of all of the facts, legal advice from Counsel indicated that there is **no prospect of success**. As a result of this advice, the formal application for a Judicial Review has been withdrawn. Nonetheless, AOWT intend to action a complaint with the Local Government Ombudsman on the manner of the 'debate' during the planning meeting.

AOWT are also recommending that the Community forms a Wormslade Action Group and that volunteers will be encouraged to join this team. Their objective will be to scrutinise every action of RAW Biogas and to ensure that they don't put a single foot wrong in the site's development and operation. Their main focus will be to ensure that operational conditions -particularly transport through the villagesare correctly applied and prosecuted in accordance with the planning conditions.

The initial meeting to discuss the above was not well attended so the Parish Council is holding another one on **THURSDAY 15**th **SEPTEMBER 2016** at the village hall – 7.30 pm.

A Neighbourhood Plan is important for the future of Clipston. With the inevitable expansion of villages and towns to satisfy housing demands, this is an opportunity to have a real say on the future of the village. It is a chance to get hold of what is on offer, namely:

♦ Communities have a right to prepare planning initiatives for their areas

- Opportunities to shape and influence future development of the village
- ♦ Greater weight in decision making

Do not be put off that Clipston is a relatively small village. Other close villages are starting the process – East Langton, Foxton, Lubenham and Guilsborough have made the first step, namely designating the village a Neighbourhood Area. Spratton is well advanced, having an imminent referendum – the final part of the process. If we do not proceed with a Neighbourhood Development Plan then Clipston may be subject to development planning speculation rather than having some control over what might happen.

Please come along whatever your views on the matter. You all have a right to be heard on what is an important matter for the times ahead.

Clipston Profile: 'Grace & Angela'



What strikes you most when you spend an afternoon in Grace's and Angela's company is not only that they share the same sense of humour, boundless energy and infectious laugh, but that their lives have been so similar despite the generation gap. Both were born and bred in the village and were the only girls in a family of boys, both attended Clipston School and were married in the chapel.

Today, they live in the village (Angela in the house where Grace was actually born!) and are stalwarts in the community ensuring the village hall runs smoothly, the papers get delivered and, over the years, the football and skittles teams are supported.

You would be hard pressed to find someone in Clipston who has not heard of Grace Burnham. She has been in charge of the village hall for over 40 years and not only cleans and maintains the facility, but organises all the events bookings, the jumble sales, and has arranged bingo and whist for many years. Her memories of village life are fascinating and enlightening, from watching the horses being shod at the forge on the High Street, to waving at American airmen from Harrington as they passed by her house on their way to the pub. She recalls standing at her doorway at the end of Kelmarsh Road and watching Coventry burning in the Blitz and she remembers Clipston School (although not altogether fondly) - "We started with scripture, then had arithmetic and afterwards, composition...I hated it!" Her clearest memory of her schooldays is being ridden to school on the handlebars of her brother's bike after a serious bout of rheumatic fever which left her too weak to walk. She missed the 11 + having fallen off her bike the day before the exam and left school at 14 to work in an underwear factory in Market Harborough. At 17, she married Douglas Burnham and they went on to have 7 children. Tragically, two died as tiny babies from a congenital heart condition, but 5 are still very much alive and living locally, either in the village or surrounding area. Grace's daughter, Angela Fellowes, is Clipston's unsung heroine! She rises at 4am every morning for her cleaning job at the golf club in Harborough. She is back in Clipston by 6.30am armed with the villagers' newspapers, some of which are delivered to the pub, and some of which she delivers by hand. By 7am, Angela is back home having done a day's work before many of us have even opened our curtains. Angela is probably best known in the village for her tireless support of the Clipston Football Team. She laughs as she explains her love of football started the day a ball was kicked in her face – while she was still a baby in her pram! Woodland Trust in Clipston

Did you know ... that former Clipston resident Miss Anne Haddon has gifted two fields in Clipston to the Woodland Trust to manage for the benefit of the community? The total area of just over 30 acres is contained within two fields, known locally as 'Great Hill' (below) and 'Little Hill', at the end of Kelmarsh Road. At short notice, some native tree planting by the Woodland Trust and a few local volunteers, took place earlier this year. Now that the land transfers are settled between the Woodland Trust and Miss Haddon, it seems like a good time to promote this resource for use by all of us. So, what is the best way of getting the community involved?

At another Woodland Trust location (also gifted by Miss Haddon) in Alhampton, near to Castle Cary in Somerset, a 'Friends of Haddon Wood' has been established. This group of interested volunteers works at the location to make 'Haddon Wood' a community resource for use by all. Remembering the Past

Clipston resident, Alex Pegram, continues to give us a fascinating insight into life in the village over the last century. In this issue, he writes about life in the village. By 1943 there was now a mood of optimism as the American forces were arriving in vast numbers. The American 8th Air Force started to take over aerodromes in Northamptonshire and East Anglia, including the airfield at Harrington, about 6 miles from Clipston. At the time RAF bomber command was using the base as an operational training unit, flying mainly Wellington bombers. Very little was known about the American operations from Harrington as it was used by the SOE (Special Operations Executive), a top secret operation whose information was 'restricted' for over 50 years. Servicemen from all surrounding camps and aerodromes came to the surrounding villages, including Clipston, when off duty. They made friends easily and kept the pubs busy too. The massive military build-up continued at full speed into 1944, in preparation for D-day in June, although the German Luftwaffe was still active overhead.

I remember an incident when the 4 of us boys were down at White Arches bridges (the old bridge by Bridge House on Kelmarsh Road), when a plane was seen approaching from the direction of Naseby. Everybody used to take part in aircraft spotting and one of the boys said it was one of our 'Blenheim bombers'. It came



down very low and as it passed overhead, we waved to it, but to our horror we could now see that it had German markings! We kept quiet about it afterwards as we did not want anybody to know that we had been waving to a German plane!

When D-day came on the 6 June we all realised that something big was happening as we were woken up very early by the noise of aeroplanes going over. When we looked out we were amazed to see the sky full of planes with many of them towing gliders. It was an amazing sight that we would never forget! At school, prayers were said for all those going into battle and I remember the headmaster, Mr Halestrap, saying that this was a great event because the outcome would bring peace to Europe.

As a result of the war, farmers were faced with immense changes to their working practices. Fields which had never been altered were now being ploughed up and tractors were rapidly replacing horses. All these changes were overseen by the War Agricultural Committee, and farmers were told how much land they must plough up and what they should grow. The Women's Land Army was recruiting as many girls and ladies as possible to work on the farms and woodlands. They proved to be a valuable asset to food production which rose to a level never known before. By 1944, Italian POWs were allowed to work on the farms, but they wore British army uniforms dyed a dark chocolate colour with large yellow patches sown on them. The POWs were available to farmers in the area, as they came from the local camp built on Farndon Road in Market Harborough.

As we all know, the war in Europe came to an end in May 1945 and Clipston celebrated the event with the same enthusiasm as the rest of the country. On the Japanese front, the fighting continued for a further 3 months until Japan surrendered on 9 August 1945, soon after the atom bombs were dropped on Hiroshima and Nagasaki. Letter

In the last Courier, I read with interest Alex Pegram's account of events in World War II and in particular his piece about the bullets passing through the hood of his young sister's pram - she had a lucky escape. At that time of the war, the sound of machine guns firing overhead was frequently heard in the villages around here when trainee gunners, sitting in the gun turrets of the Wellington bombers from the airfield at Husbands Bosworth, were practising firing at targets towed by smaller aircraft. I'm sure the bullets were expected to fall harmlessly some distance away in open countryside, but occasionally a few went astray into a residential area.

I also probably had a narrow escape when as a boy, playing with others outside in Gold Street, with the sound of machine guns overhead, a bullet



whistled down beside me into the road. I'dug' the .303 calibre bullet out of the tarmac and have kept it as a souvenir of the war-time days.

From my photograph, the flattened point caused by the impact into the road is clear to see.
