Clipston's Got Talent!

She 'flies through the air with the greatest of ease...' is certainly a phrase that can be said of 12-year-old Amelia Wallis who will compete later this month (for the 2nd year running – last year she came 5th overall!) in the national trampolining competition at the NIA in Birmingham. Qualifying to represent the East Midlands in the under 13 age group of the NDP (National Development Plan) Level 3, she will have to perform two routines, one with ten set moves and one with ten voluntary moves, partly chosen by her coach, Kieran Grundy, and partly by Amelia herself. She will be scored by 5 judges who can deduct marks for anything from a wrongly executed move to how straight her fingers and toes are. 'The marking is so strict,' she tells me, 'and you can lose a competition just by .1 of a mark. If you land a move on one foot or at a diagonal rather than straight then you get immediate disqualification.' In fact, Amelia says she has even seen marks deducted if underwear is seen poking out of a leotard, or for wearing the wrong-coloured trampolining socks!

Amelia has been trampolining for the Market Harborough Trampolining Academy (MHTA) since the age of nine and has two 2-hour sessions a week on the trampolines and one session in the gym working on core strength. I asked her how she practises the more difficult rotations and

sequences without getting injured: 'The first time we learn a new move we are attached to a rig belt which is like a giant bungee and the coach can pull us back if we go wrong. It's quite scary when you perform a move for the first time without the belt but generally the coach won't let us do that until he knows we are confident with the routine.' There is also a control mat which can be placed on the trampoline and this stops Amelia from going too high or too fast as she tells me it is much easier to control a move the slower you do it.

Amelia competes from October through

month. Her favourite move is a 'lazy back' which is a straight-back somersault landing on your tummy. Amelia loves it but her mum, Rebekah, says it is quite a scary move to watch as she seems to turn so slowly you think she's is never going to make it round in time... needless to say, she always does!

When I went to interview Amelia, she showed me the huge hoard of medals which hangs on her wardrobe door – I counted at least 35 bronze, silver and gold medals and with the nationals coming up in the next few weeks, let's hope that this number continues to grow, with

a national recognition to add to the ever-

growing array. Good luck, Amelia!!

Clipston Profile: Emily-Jane Clark



Journalist, Emily-Jane Clark, knows a thing or two about sleep. Or rather the lack of it. Her hilarious, self-deprecating and honest blog about being up every night with her children when they were tiny, has taken her writing career in an unexpected direction and has now led to a book deal and a nomination for a comedy award. She lives in Clipston with her husband James, and daughters Isla and Cleo.

"I started off trying to be an actress," Emily-Jane reveals, along with her story about a brief foray as a member of a girl band and a stint at McDonalds while she attended auditions in London in her twenties. But struggling to make ends meet, her family convinced her to go to university, where she studied English and followed it up with a journalism qualification. Fast forward a few years, and Emily -Jane is a freelance journalist living in Clipston, mother of two babies (18 months apart) and very sleep deprived. "After Cleo was born I couldn't cope with work as well as the girls. I just wasn't getting any sleep at all - neither of them slept. It was a really hard time." She is quite candid about suffering from postnatal depression, which made the sleep deprivation even harder to deal with. "I had basically hit rock bottom," she says "One night I was delirious at about 4am and wrote down how I was feeling and made myself laugh. I posted it onto a blog, not really expecting people to read it." But within a few days, Emily-Jane's frank and funny account of her sleepdeprived life had gone viral and been viewed by over half a million people.

The blog saved her sanity. "It helped me connect with so many tired mums. It made me feel better, and hopefully them too. I used humour as therapy." She recounts many funny incidents as a

result of being completely shattered. "I told the postman I loved him once," she says, still mortified at the recollection. "My brain was just not working properly. He handed me a parcel and I said "Love you" instead of "Thank you". And then the next time he brought a parcel I was focussing so much on *not* saying it again.... that I did!"

As she continues with her blog and emerges from the fug of new parenthood, her career is taking off again with her work appearing regularly in Metro magazine, the Huffington Post, Good Housekeeping, The Mail Online and many other newspapers and magazines. "Having the blog was like an online CV. I got lots of work writing about being a parent, but I'm starting to move into other areas now as well, including current affairs and mental health." Her latest project is a book, based on her blog, called 'Sleep is for the Weak' which, in her own words is "the first book ever written about babies and sleep to contain no advice whatsoever."

Despite being an expert on sleep deprivation, Emily-Jane's real ambition lies in scriptwriting. A short script she submitted to the Funny Women Comedy Writing Awards gained her a place as a finalist in 2016. Attending the awards ceremony she found it incredibly inspiring. She continues to work on script ideas, with a view to writing for TV, and has started another book; this time a novel. She also works as a volunteer for HomeStart, which provides support to families in need and mothers suffering from post natal illness.

With all that going on in her life, it looks like Emily-Jane won't have time for sleep anyway...

Clipston Weather

March 2017

Rainfall amounted to 57.9 mm - slightly above average, with most coming in the first week. The last nine days were quite dry, with only 2 mm falling on the 28th.

Temperatures were well above average, with the maximum of 20°C on the 30th and a daytime mean of over 11°C, both being the highest I have recorded for March in 37 years. The night temperatures were also well above average, with no air frost recorded in my screen.

April 2017

The dry spell continued well into April, with no rain measured until the 12th, and then only a light shower in the evening. Total rainfall was 17.1 mm – the fourth lowest I have recorded for April. That is less than a third of average. This included some hail, sleet, and snow showers which came on the 25th although none settled for very long.

The daytime mean temperature for the month was average, despite the maximum of 24°C on Sunday 9th which was my second highest recorded for April. Night temperatures were above normal, although I recorded slight air frost on three occasions in the screen. A ground thermometer revealed that grass temperatures were about two degrees lower.

Clipston Past & Present

If you had stepped out of the door of The Bulls Head around 120 years ago, you would have been greeted with a view that looked a bit like this! Looking down towards The Green, with Clipston House in the background, we know this image was taken before 1897 because there are no lime trees on The Green. As we mentioned in the last issue, the lime trees were planted in 1897 for Queen Victoria's jubilee. Today they hide Clipston House from view.

So much else in this photograph has changed though. The road is an obvious one—full of puddles it must have been extremely muddy. These roads were made out of granite, stone and slag, and through the winter months became almost impassable due to the mud and the deep ruts from cart and wagon wheels.* Proper tarmacked roads were not widespread in the village until the 1930s. The row of buildings was originally all thatched, and back in the 1890s. The Bulls Head was flanked by a harness makers and a sweet shop. Sandwiched in the middle (the one with two figures at the door) the pub would have been much smaller. Today the cottage housing the sweet shop is no longer there, replaced by the three 1970s houses set back from the road.

The Bulls Head was one of four pubs recorded in the village over the centuries; the others included The Red Lion on The Green (which only recently stopped trading), The Boot & Crown at 11 High Street, and The Rose & Crown which stood on the land on Chapel Lane between Mill House and The Manse. These last two, however, only existed before 1885.

Coronation Celebrations in 1902



With the Clipston festival approaching once again, we thought it would be interesting to look at other village events through the ages. Peter Wilford found this photograph in his collection, which is of the celebrations for the Coronation of Edward VII in 1902. The photograph was taken at Clipston House on the village green, where the gardens—now Chestnut Grove— were often the venue for village events. In the book 'Clipston—A Heritage' it says that 'the villagers enjoyed a sumptuous

meal in the grounds of the house and the Northampton Town Silver Band paraded round the village at 10 o'clock. This was followed by a service in the church, given by the Revd Edwards. The celebrations closed with games, dancing and a fireworks display.' The coronation was planned for the 26 June, but was delayed until 9 August due to the King's sudden illness. However the residents of Clipston decided to go ahead with the celebrations in June anyway.

Air Ambulance **Summer Garden Party**

As I write this it has been raining, sleeting, snowing and then beautiful sunshine. Hopefully by the time you read this the better weather will be with us and there will be lots going on in the garden.

Already the peonies are budding up and are a beautiful flower to cut or buy and use indoors especially when mixed with other seasonal flowers like alchemilla mollis, lilac, roses and sweet peas. Peo-

nies prefer to be in water as they are thirsty flowers. If your peonies wilt, submerge the stems up to the blooms in room temperature water for at least twenty minutes, then re-cut the stems and place in clean, cold water for about two hours. They should then be ready to use.

In Victorian times, peonies were thought to represent shame or bashfulness but now it is an omen of good fortune and happiness in marriage which is why they are a popular wedding flower and are the official flower for the 12th wedding anniversary.

In June and July, the club is having a

members' demonstration and a garden visit. Dates and venue are to be confirmed. August, we do not meet but looking ahead to September we have a wonderful demonstrator Lorena Dyer coming to the Flower Club. More details to follow but Lorena is a very talented and entertaining lady so I can guarantee that it will be a lovely evening.
