Clipston WI is 100!

As Clipston WI prepares to celebrate its 100th anniversary, current president, Rose Anderson, tells us about how it began and the work it has done in the village over the last century.

2018 looks set to be a year of 100 celebrations –100 years since the end of the First World War, 100 years since women began to get the vote, and on 17th May, 100 years since Mrs Fisher became the first president of Clipston Women's Institute and our village WI was born.

When it was founded in 1918 there were 77 members, with girls from 12 years old joining as "juniors" and learning shorthand. Initially the group met in the old Calvinist Chapel on Gold Street, and then in 1929 meetings moved to what was the church hall, now the village hall. In 1929 it cost 2/6d for afternoon meetings, with £1 for use of the piano. Meetings were held weekly in the afternoons and monthly in the evenings.

The WI has a long tradition of getting involved in (and hopefully enhancing) village life; in its early days it held singing classes and with Mrs Wartnaby as conductor entered the musical festival in Northampton where it gained first prize with 87 marks in the unison song. In 1939 it organised a Christmas party for all the village children, including evacuees.

Clipston WI Centenary (continued from p1)

The Clipston and District Horticultural Show, or "Mini Royal", as it was known, was an important annual event held in the grounds of Clipston House. The WI provided the catering each year for as many as 400-500 visitors. In 1922 the profit amounted to £21.

It kept going during the difficult war years, doing its bit for Home and Country. On Friday afternoons a sale of surplus fruit and vegetables took place with 10 per cent in a shilling being contributed to Red Cross funds for our prisoners of war. By 1945 £520 had been raised. From 1942 until the end of the war meetings were held in the Baptist Chapel schoolroom because of blackout restrictions. During this time a link was formed with WIs in New Zealand and Australia who sent food parcels to help out with rationing.

The WI in Clipston nearly folded in the early 1970s when although a committee was elected, no one was willing to be president. Grace Burnham (who is still a member after 72 years!) saved the day by agreeing to be secretary, if the then secretary, Mrs Kettle, would be president. Luckily, she agreed!

A highlight in June 2015 was when Linda Lake attended, as our representative, the national centenary garden party at Buckingham Palace, being introduced to HRH Princess Alexandra.

So here we still are in 2018, part of the largest voluntary women's organisation in the UK and one of six in the county to reach their centenary this year.

Did you know the WI have vintage china and tablecloths for hire?



We continue the tradition of community involvement and over the years have:

- Provided teas for the steam weekend and fetes
- Planted trees on the playing field and donated a bench
- Maintained a flower bed on the village green
- Raised money for local and national charities
- Provided friendship and educational opportunities for members

We don't know what the future holds – times change – but maybe in 1918 the ladies little thought that Clipston WI would still be here in 2018, one of the oldest in the county. We are proud to have reached this milestone and would love to welcome ladies to our meetings and celebrations.

Superfast Broadband Update

Much has been happening in the village regarding our quest to have access to superfast broadband!



The project to bring BT Openreach superfast fibre to Clipston hit an obstacle when it was discovered the Kelmarsh wind farm grant was not going to be available to help fund it after all. Crowdfunding was the only way to help pay for the Openreach installation. The campaign was a

success and within two weeks the full £5,750 was raised with contributions from the school and more than 70 households and businesses in the village. A huge thank you to each and everyone who contributed. Residents now have access to a choice of over 150 Internet service providers and speeds of up to 50-60Mbps.

In addition to this, Gigaclear have been laying ultrafast fibre cables around the village, which will give those who want it access to even greater broadband speeds from 50Mbps to 1000 Mbps (1G). Gigaclear's service will become live in March. Cables are laid directly to your premises and for early takers of the Gigaclear service, they are offering a free installation (subject to a quick site inspection). Clipston Neighbourhood Development Plan

Thank you to everyone who took the time to respond to our recent questionnaire regarding the future development of the village. Almost 30% of Clipston residents responded to the questionnaire, a pretty good response level.

Important positive aspects of the village that were noted include: countryside, community activities, the Bulls Head, and the Courier. Key areas of concern included: Traffic (speed/parking), more appropriate housing and more female involvement to improve the balance of the committees!

The open event on the 25th February attracted over 65 attendees and captured more views and observations about how our village should be developed. The findings will be published as part of the final report and on <u>www.clipston.org/</u> <u>clipston.ndp</u>.

Pupils from Clipston School produced their artistic interpretation of Clipston's NDP as a 'logo' and a public vote was held at the open event. The winning entry, by Ellie Woodgate, was voted the clear winner by attendees (see below).

The next phase for the plan involves committee work in three theme areas: Housing; Environment & Heritage; Community, Transport & Employment.

Clipston Profile: Peter Wilford



Peter Wilford's family have lived in Clipston for over 280 years. With such strong village roots and a lifelong passion for photography and film making, it is therefore not surprising that Peter, following on from his father, is the unofficial archivist for Clipston, looking after and continually adding to a photo library of hundreds of village images dating as far back as the 1860s.

Peter was born in 1935 at number 4 Gold Street and grew up surrounded by family, as his grandparents lived next door (his grandfather, George, was the head gardener at Clipston House at the turn of the 20th century, and planted the trees on the village green). Peter lived with his parents until he married Jean in 1969, when he bought a piece of land about 100 metres up the road on Chapel Lane, and designed and built the house where they still live today. Working in property maintenance, design and then civil engineering at Harborough Council, his skills were put to good use in the management of the build, and he had it all ready for them to move in after their wedding.

Peter's interest in photography began at an early age, inspired by his parents. "My mum and dad were both into photography, owning their own box cameras and developing their own pictures. I remember the first photos I ever took were on a school trip to Paris when I was sixteen. I converted an outside loo at home into a dark room and developed my photos there. I bought my first simple camera in 1952, but it wasn't until 1956 that I could afford to buy something better—a second-hand 35mm folding camera. One of my first projects was to go around the village, recording Clipston as it was then, on colour slides." His father, Maurice, was a collector of old images of Clipston – a combination of old postcards that were sold in the village post office, and images lent and copied from Clipston residents. It was to this collection that Peter added his own images, slowly expanding the library that continues today. In the 1960s Peter and his father put together a cine film on the history of Clipston. It was so well received that they ended up making it into a book, *Clipston Heritage*, published in 1979 with a revised edition in 1991.

When Peter did his National Service and was stationed for 16 months in Osnabruck, Germany, he took his hobby with him. "I was trained as a wireless operator," he explains "but when I got to Osnabruck, I ended up as an unofficial photographer, taking photos of special visits and events that took place. My interest in cameras and recording equipment led me to run the regimental shop, which sold all sorts of things to the troops, including cameras and tape recorders." He so loved using this equipment that he remembers recording audio messages which he sent home to his parents instead of writing letters.

Peter has always been fascinated by the relationship between film and audio, and the constant challenge to marry up images and sound. Of course today, all you need is a smartphone to record both perfectly, but the equipment Peter grew up with was a little trickier. He recalls

Clipston Weather

November 2017

November was quite dry with less than 60% of my average rainfall for November; 12 dry days and then snow on the 25th and 30th. Temperatures were about average, with 12 days above 10°C and air frost on nine nights.

December 2017

December rainfall was high with almost 60% above average totalling 110.9 mm. Almost a third of this came on the 26th with rain turning to snow overnight resulting in about 100 mm of wet snow next morning. On both the 10th and 11th, I had to melt snow from my rain gauge when the accumulation was about 120 mm deep. I have to go back to February 2009 to find a record of a greater snow depth. Maximum temperatures were average, although the thermometer did not rise above freezing all day on three consecutive days. Minimum temperatures were a degree above average, although I recorded air frost on 14 nights. It was -6°C on the 11th, the lowest in any December since 2010.

January 2018

I recorded rain or snow, on all but five days in January. The total precipitation for the month was 72 mm – 7% above my average. Daytime temperatures were slightly above average, with a maximum of 12°C on the 24th and 28th. Night temperatures were more than a degree above average, although I recorded air frost on nine nights, the lowest being a modest -2°C for January.

February 2018

Precipitation for the month was only 36.6 mm which is about 27% below my February average. Ten days were dry; however, snow came in the last three days (continuing into March) with an accumulation of around 60mm in depth. There were very low temperatures at the end of the month. I recorded eight consecutive nights with frost, including a low of -8°C on the 27th and 28th and maximum daytime temperatures of -1°C and -3°C respectively. I have to go back to Jan 2013 to find a night minimum as low as -8°C, and to Feb 2012 for an even lower -12°C. Using the average of a month's day and night temperatures, I have to go back to January 2010 to find a colder month than this February.


Clipston Past & Present


In this issue we compare this fantastic old photo of Clipston High Street (taken from The Green and looking down towards the church) with the same view today. Berry House is visible in both photographs, but back in 1900 it was flanked by two blacksmiths—one is still recognisable as Forge Cottage on the right, but the other—the thatched and ivy-covered building in the foreground—has long since been pulled down.

The thatched building was part of the premises of Berry House and was run by blacksmith William Perkins. The other smithy was John Hensman, who was then succeeded by his son Charles who died in about 1950, when the forge closed. Older Clipston residents will remember the Hensman's forge from their childhood, which was a popular meeting place for village children. In fact up to 1928 the school had no playground, so the children would play in the street, and run across the road to see the horses shod in their playtime!

On the right of the 1900 photograph (not very visible in this photo, but shown below in another photo from the era) was a village pump on the grassy verge. In 2018, the verge, once public land, seems to have disappeared—the creeping boundary of the house beyond appears to have incorporated the well into that corner of their garden!

Sulby Gardens


