Trevor Lake: Reader

It was nearly four years ago that I first gave thought to some form of formal training in ministry. After much consider



Trevor and Bishop John ation and discernment by several people around the diocese I started training in September 2015. This involved one night a week study, numerous homework projects, periodic full-day Saturdays, weekends at the Ely diocese training centre and assignments to fulfil each training module undertaken. I was fortunate to be in a wonderful cohort of students and over the three years we have supported each other and most certainly learned from each other's life experiences. Most, like me, were hoping to become, what is titled in the Church of England, a reader. So what exactly is a reader? They are lay people from all walks of life, called by God, theologically trained and licensed by the bishop to preach, teach, lead worship and assist in pastoral, evangelistic and liturgical work. Readers duties vary according to their gifting and the church environment but one style of worship introduced during my training is a Worship 4 Everyone service on the first Sunday of the month at 10 am. This is a short service of about half an hour and is often about a particular topic or one of Jesus' parables; there are usually some

video clips to illustrate the story, a couple of songs and always a get together afterwards for coffee, soft drinks and a biscuit (or two). The service is very popular with all generations - come along and see for yourself.

So on 1st July this year it was a pure delight to have Bishop John (the Bishop of Brixworth) come to All Saints Clipston and admit and license me as a reader within the Peterborough diocese, and specifically in our benefice of Clipston with Naseby and Haselbech and Kelmarsh. I am grateful to all those of you who have shown support during my training and I hope and pray that I will be of service to our communities in the years ahead. I am now licenced to undertake a number of tasks for the church, including leading worship and funerals, which will be an added resource to our benefice in the future.

Festival: Wall Repairs

Many thanks to all those who contributed towards the churchyard wall repairs through the events at the excellent festival weekend. As you will have seen the first section of the wall repairs has been completed and we have plans to do the whole of the wall over time, section by section, as funding permits.



The weekend of the festival was an important one for the church as we had the Bishop of Brixworth with us in the benefice over the weekend. Having attended the festival evening entertainments on Saturday he welcomed Trevor Lake as a reader for the Church of England the following Sunday morning, and also welcomed several young people from the village and surrounding areas to take Communion ahead of their confirmations during the service.



The PCC is now about to start planning for the next phase of refurbishment which will include major alterations and redecorations. Also keep your eyes open for details of major changes to the way in which the churches in this area are to be re-arranged in the near future. Having completed the church roof project, the PCC is holding a special celebratory service in the Church on Thursday 13th September, to give thanks for the new roof and to record our thanks to the grant bodies and those responsible for the work. It will be a short dedication service followed by wine and nibbles in the Orbell room and everyone is welcome. The service starts at 7.30 p.m.

Clipston's Got Talent

If you managed to visit the Baptist Chapel during the Clipston Festival, you would have seen some amazing quilts hanging inside, several of which were made by the very talented Ruth Wallett. When I went to visit her, I was therefore expecting to be shown a large collection of quilts but was surprised to discover that she has many other strings to her bow.

"I would probably describe myself as a bit of a butterfly when it comes to creating things," she

tells me. "Whatever I want to design and make, I use the skills most appropriate for that particular piece. It could be embroidery or mixed media, or all forms of textiles including metal." From a cushion to a book; a lampshade to a waistcoat, Ruth has demonstrated her artistic talent in many ways over the years but has really focussed on her creativity since retiring from her job as a primary school headteacher.

"I've always sewn, since I was a child," she explains. "My mother was a tailoress, so I grew up making clothes for my dolls, and then clothes for me and my children. But it wasn't until I left teaching and had more time that I began to branch out into other things." Enrolling herself on several City & Guilds courses, Ruth gained diplomas in Creative Embroidery, Machine Embroidery and Patchwork & Quilting, which equipped her with new skills and ideas to take into her creative work.

She takes inspiration from both the natural world (she studied zoology, geography and botany when she was younger), and her love of travel. "I get so inspired when I go to different places," she says enthusiastically. "My husband Roger and I have done several trips to New Zealand, and a lot of my work has stemmed from my experiences there. I love to combine the Maori influences with the natural world - New Zealand is such a beautiful



country." The quilt she is holding in the picture is one of her New Zealand-inspired creations, incorporating the Maori koru – a spiral shape based on the appearance of an unfurling silver fern, one of the country's national symbols.

In addition to her own work, Ruth helps inspire the work of others and leads a textile group called 'Textend' which she helped to start up four years ago. "I knew lots of people who had enthusiasm for textiles like me and were keen to 'extend' their skills and continue learning new things. We began with 9 of us, and now there are 71!". Ruth organises a programme of workshops in North Kilworth each year, bringing in experts in particular fields, or drawing on the talents of group members themselves. "It's an opportunity to share ideas, learn new techniques and spend time together doing what we love doing", she explains. Ruth has clearly found her niche, and the



quality and originality of her work is a real testament to her talent and enthusiasm. So next time she showcases her work, go along and get inspired too!

Haddon Fields Open Day

Come along and enjoy a fun afternoon of exploration for children (and parents too) at Haddon Fields. Our open day is on **Sunday 16**th **September and** will once again feature Jules Howard.



He will lead groups around Haddon Fields looking for water-life in the stream and fossil hunting on the 'fossil' bank of the stream in Great Hill.

Help our wildlife experts, Nigel Lingley and Alison Ball, conduct a bug hunt which will involve 'sweep-netting' to find out what is

find out what is living among the grasses and wildflowers and 'beating trays' to catch those to be dislodged from the trees and bushes, to see how many we can identify and record.

Katy, our local artist, will also be running a bug and butterfly workshop for children of all ages!

And please don't forget your picnics!

If all goes to plan, we hope that a new footbridge in Great Hill will be in place. This will allow us to start the development of a circular walking route around Haddon Fields and avoid the dangerous traffic on Longhold Road.

Clipston Neighbourhood Development Plan Update

Following on from the update given in the June edition of the Clipston Courier the three theme groups are con-



tinuing with the preparation of their respective reports which will be incorporated in the completed plan.

Some of you will have noted the application for residential development at the corner of Gold Street and Naseby Road. This application will proceed in accordance with current planning process (including a reference to the Village

Design Statement) but it <u>will not</u> refer to the Neighbourhood Development Plan currently being prepared.

It is up to you whether you want to comment on the application, but if you feel unhappy with it, you may wish to make the point that the advisory committee is in the process of preparing a Neighbourhood Development Plan in order to give some control to Clipston as to the whereabouts of proposed development sites, as opposed to the whereabouts of such sites being determined by a developer and the planning authority.

Clipston Horse Power!

Horses are a big feature of Clipston life, but did you know that the village is a centre for disabled riding? About ten years ago, Julia Aked from Riding for the Disabled (RDA) set up a base at Clipston Riding School to cater specifically for adults who had started riding in childhood at nearby Holdenby. Lessons at Holdenby are restricted

to children due to the size of the horses, and so Julia, who has been involved with the RDA for many years, extended the centre to Clipston so that her growing pupils could continue to ride as adults. She even uses one of her own horses; a magnificent hunter called Jim.

"Horses are very intuitive and seem to know when they have a disabled rider on their back." explains John

Oldershaw, a qualified RDA coach

who has volunteered with Julia at both Clipston and Holdenby for the last six years. "They are often more patient and well-behaved and tend not to react to things that might usually bother them. It's amazing to see." John also describes how riding can



benefit all kinds of disability. "We have people with a wide range of disabilities from cerebral palsy to autism," he says. "We have one pupil who rides because if she didn't, she probably wouldn't be able to walk. Riding helps to build strength in the core muscles as it mimics walking. For others it's about building confidence and connecting with the horses." Julia, John and several other local volunteers use

the facilities in Clipston to teach pupils who range in age from 15 right up to 88. Lessons involve games where they have to collect hoops and control their horses. Some ride without a leader, and some can trot and canter independently, including Jo, who is completely blind. They undertake exams and have five grades to work through.

The RDA is a charity and relies on volunteers. John Oldershaw is currently looking

They try to place the ball... we just try to hit it.



Clipston Weather



May 2018

The month started quite dry when I recorded rainfall on only five occasions within the first 23 days, including a period of 11 totally dry days. The month's total was 79.5 mm - about 25% above my average for May.

Temperatures were above average with many totally sunny days in the first three weeks and a maximum of 26°C on Monday 7th followed by 25° the next day.

June 2018


Following a very wet last week of May, the month of June has been virtually dry. The only precipitation I witnessed was a very slight shower on Saturday 16th amounting to only 0.1 mm. This was the lowest monthly rainfall I have recorded. Temperatures were well above average with 20 days above 20°C and five above 25°C in the last week with sun virtually all day.

July 2018

The dry, hot, sunny weather continued into July with 25 totally dry days. Total rain for the month was only 21.6 mm less than a third of my 40 years average. Temperatures were well above average with 20 days at, or above, 25°C and the remainder at or above 20°C.

Coffee & Chat for Canine Partners



Have you spotted some posters appearing once a month saying "Coffee & Chat" and wondered what it was all about? Well, it is a coffee morning that happens on the third Saturday of each month in the village hall at 10.30am. It has been held since 2012 and with everyone's support we have raised money for various causes but over more recent times it is solely for the assistance dog charity called Canine Partners.

We are focused on raising £5,000. This will mean we can name a puppy and put it through its first chapter from the age of eight weeks to 12 to 14 months. The future assistance dogs live with fantastic voluntary puppy parents where they learn fundamental skills they will need to start advanced training. From there the young dog will join one of the centres for their advanced training – about 17 weeks long — and learn the crucial and complex skills necessary to support a person with disabilities.

So... our aim is to raise £5,000 – latest news ONLY£854 needed! Looking ahead – we run a tombola at our November coffee and chat. Clipston Profile: Julie Connell

A beautiful wooden owl (brought back by her son, William, from the Beijing Olympics) greets any visitor to Julie Connell's new house, tucked secretly away off the village green, and as the drive opens up, her stunning NGS garden beckons with its myriad colours, unusual specimens,

where she lived for nearly 30 years – 'We had such a large fruit cage, the pupils to whom I taught music would come and earn extra money by picking all the berries throughout the summer.

Which leads us to another passion and skill of Julie Connell – music. Having

For over 30 years, Julie organised hugely profitable and well-run equestrian events at local, national and international level. As secretary and treasurer of the Pytchley Hunt Supporters Association she was involved in many fundraising events and her contacts here led

her on a very exciting career path from organising local horse trials to becoming the director, secretary and treasurer for the National Dressage Championships, organising the start and timing teams of the steeplechase at the Burghley International Threeday Event (in 2015 Julie won the 'Unsung Hero' award for her services to the Burghley Horse Trials since 1982) and the advanced horse trials including an Olympic trial at the Althorp Advanced Horse Trials and Country Fair.

And if gardener, horse-trial organiser and music teacher is not enough,
Julie is also the Shires representative for Cheffins Fine Arts Auctioneers and Valuers and holds valuations at her house throughout the year.

She may get a bit of help with the 'heavy stuff' in the garden these days and her arthritic fingers may mean that she 'doesn't play the piano quite as dextrously as (she) used to' but one thing you can certainly say about the indomitable 'no nonsense' character of Julie Connell is that she is certainly not ready to slow down quite yet... as she dashes off into the garden to water, before a pupil arrives for their lesson!

ornamental trees and secret pathways. Since 2006, Julie has been opening her garden (first at The Maltings, and latterly The Wooden Owl) in aid of the National Garden Scheme, and has had over 9,000 visitors, made over £25,000 for NGS and nearly £10,000 for local charities includ-



ing the school and church. Her love of gardening began in a mews house in London where she had a tiny space which she filled with clematis – she has since grown 80 different kinds of clematis and tells me 'you can have a clematis of one sort or another flowering all year round'. As well as the many different and beautiful plants, Julie also grows fruit and veg. She remembers her huge garden at The Old Parsonage in Dingley

spent a year in Florence studying art and music in 1959, Julie graduated from the Guildhall School of Music and Drama in 1962 and has been teaching music ever since. She is the organist at Clipston and Kelmarsh churches and tries to play in Dingley whenever she can. In 2015 she set up the United Benefice Choir who practice every fortnight and sing on the 5th Sunday in a month. She organises the Celebration of Christmas Concert every year in All Saints Church and has organised various musical charity events including the Queen's 90th Birthday celebrations and a Gilbert and Sullivan concert, raising over £5000 for the church. Her latest project (in the church in November this year) is a musical and poetry evening of Rupert Brooke's works to coincide with the centenary of the end of World War 1.

Julie's ability to organise everyone and everything has always been a skill - she laughs as she tells me her school report stated she was a 'very bossy but very efficient pupil who excelled in music and sport'. Certainly this is an accurate description when you take a look at her CV.

Letter to the Editor

As a member, just one of about twenty, of one of the "theme" groups currently trying to create a "Neighbourhood Development Plan" for Clipston, I just wanted to try and explain why we continue to need the support and involvement of everyone in the village.

Once we have such a plan in existence it will carry weight and legal authority with planning applications and all other developments within the village and it is only right therefore that the community as a whole has had a chance to influence or contribute to the plan. Until this plan has been accepted and adopted we are at the mercy of developers and the planners at DCC, all of whom are faced with increased pressure from central government. Without an NDP in place (and it is someway off yet) we have no say... although it might be useful, if you are contemplating complaining to DDC about any proposed developments, to point out that there is an "emerging" NDP. I fully understand why people may feel such a plan is a waste of time, a waste of energy and will make no difference (especially in the light of the way the Village Design Statement appeared to have little clout) but it is clear from recent planning applications that an NDP is absolutely vital if we want to have that

say in how Clipston develops.

The 3 "theme" groups (Community, Environment, Housing) have been working hard since March to put together a credible plan, based on YOUR responses to the survey and at the consultation event that many of you attended, and once written it will be shared with the village to seek approval. 


