

### Clipston School 1964 - Christmas Card

Each year the Market Harborough corset and swimwear company, R. & W. H. Symington & Co. Ltd. produced a Christmas card to send to their clients. In 1964 they commissioned a Northampton artist, Frank Morgan, to paint a picture for their card of Clipston School as it could have looked soon after it was completed in 1673. When I first saw the card, I thought the artist had made a mistake in showing the old bell turret as a circular structure, rather than square, as seen on the earliest photographs of about 1900. However, I later found a copy of an old engraving of a drawing believed to be about 1720. This shows a circular turret and proves the artist got it right. (Ed: Today, there is no turret on the school).

# Wildlife Sanctuary

One of the few areas of land left in the country that hasn't been built on or farmed are our churchyards. As a result, much of our native flora and fauna has disappeared and more is under threat. Increased use of chemicals for farming, whilst increasing yields and benefiting us, has meant that old natural meadowland is rare. By their very nature, churchyards have not been affected by such chemicals and, although most of them are managed and mowed regularly, could support native plants and creatures. Here in Clipston we are looking at the possibility of allocating a section of the



churchyard as a nature reserve which would be managed so that wild flowers, native creatures such as butterflies, moths and insects etc would be encouraged.

We already have an area in mind and would like to hear from any individuals or groups who might like to be involved with the planning and implementation of this project. We will need to prepare a detailed plan, conduct surveys of what is already there. Please contact Steve Carpenter if you would like more information or would like to be involved.


# **Neighbourhood Development Plan**

Accompanying the last issue of the Clipston Courier was the Summary of the pre-submission Clipston Neighbourhood Plan which, amongst other things, invited comments on that Plan to be submitted within the consultation period which ended on 30th October 2020.

33 sets of comments have now been received raising a wide variety of matters. The Neighbourhood Plan Advisory Committee are, with the help of the appointed consultants, considering all of the comments and making the appropriate amendments to the Neighbourhood Plan.

That amended Plan will then be issued to Daventry District Council who will proceed with a separate 6 week consultation process. This will include publication on the Daventry District Council web-site of the amended Plan, together with the comments that have been received by us and how they have been considered and, if appropriate, incorporated in the Plan. Once again further comments can again be made on the amended Plan but on this occasion to the Daventry District Council.

Following receipt by the Daventry District Council of the final comments the Plan will be sent to an independent inspector appointed by the Council for his/her approval. Upon receipt of the approval the Plan will then be put to the residents of Clipston for the yes/no referendum.

When it became necessary to stop these regular meetings quite a few people said that they missed the chance to meet up and catch up so we started online Zoom café meetings every Wednesday morning instead. # **Alex Pegram Tribute**

Alex Pegram was born in Kelmarsh Road in Clipston on 6 February 1932, and died just round the corner, in his home in Bassett Way on 12 August 2020, aged eighty-eight. The fact that Alex lived in Clipston almost his entire life meant he was a fountain of local knowledge and his prolific writings from his childhood, Clipston during WWII, his time in National Service, and of the changes he saw in Clipston over eight decades are invaluable to the history of our village. In later years, there was nothing Alex enjoyed more than recounting tales of growing up in the village that meant the world to him, and where he lived, happily, with his family and friends for so many years, and it was always an absolute pleasure to listen to his incredible memories of bygone days, and browse the hundreds of photos he'd collected.

We featured Alex in our Clipston Profile back in 2016, and his writings have been published extensively in the Courier, but we on the editorial team knew Alex as a friend, as well as a neighbour and fellow villager, and we just wanted to pay tribute here to the fascinating, kind, passionate, determined man that he was, who always had a story to tell with a twinkle in his eye.





There was nothing he enjoyed more than delivering the Courier to all the houses in Kelmarsh Road, and he looked forward to it as a chance to catch up and chat to people while taking his daily exercise.

From burning the village pigsty down as a teenager after a sneaky cigarette with his mates to walking to Harrington to help the American GIs there clean their boots, Alex's tales were full of fun and laughter, and he brought to life what it was like to grow up in Clipston during the war years and beyond. Many of his photographs can be seen on the Parish Council website, clipstonparishcouncil.org.uk and it is well worth the time and effort to browse through as they give a truly fascinating insight to a period of village life that would otherwise be lost. And there may be more to come! Alex insisted that his extensive archive of Clipston information should be catalogued and published, so in time, we will endeavour to honour his wishes.

But it wasn't just his incredible memory for detail that made Alex such a wonderful character – he was warm and generous and was always ready to chat over the fence, invite you in for a cuppa, and, if you were lucky, a home-baked cherry bun that, right up until only a few months before he died, he would bake himself, along with all his own bread. He wanted to share his love for Clipston with all, so he set about organising a surprise for his wife Mary to celebrate their 6oth wedding anniversary. His idea was to purchase a commemorative bench and place it in Haddon Fields for all to enjoy. As Alex said himself, he wanted the bench to face towards the church, so you could see the village spread out before you.

Sadly, Alex's funeral could only be attended by very close family and friends due to Covid restrictions, but Karen, his daughter, has said that as soon as they are able, there will be a 'proper knees-up which is what Dad wanted' in the village hall for all those in Clipston and beyond who knew and loved Alex. Alex will be sorely missed in the village but the stories he has left will, I hope, be enjoyed for generations to come and will help to keep Clipston's history, and indeed, the memory of Alex Pegram himself, very much alive for us all.

# The Hygiene Bank

I just wanted to take this opportunity to say a huge thank you to everyone in Clipston for your support for The Hygiene Bank! Just to give a bit of a background, a donation box was put in the church porch in August (thanks goes to Tess Wilford for the suggestion & to Faye Tan for getting the go ahead!) We have been overwhelmed by the support from the village, the amount of donations we have received has been so incredibly generous, it is a true reflection of what a lovely community Clipston is & makes me very proud to live here!



The Hygiene Bank was founded in 2018 due to the hidden "hygiene poverty" crisis in the UK. Over 14 million people in the UK live in poverty. We know that long before people go to a food bank they stop buying toiletries; hygiene essentials and personal care products quickly become out of reach luxuries. Sadly, with the current pandemic this is becoming a reality for more & more people. Recognising the need in our area, Judy Rowley made the decision to set up The Harborough Hygiene Bank in July this year. We are gradually building up partnerships with local charities who will distribute the donations to those in need. So far donations from Clipston have been distributed to The Well in Kibworth & Home-Start South Leicestershire who then deliver them to places where they will be appreciated more than we may ever know. If you are thinking of making a donation there is currently a pressing need for household cleaning products such as washing detergent & kitchen surface sprays etc.

# Friends of Haddon Fields – Education Centre

At long last!! Hopefully many of you will have seen the Education Centre in-situ by now. It seems like a really long time since the idea was floated among the Friends of Haddon Fields (FoHF) committee. Well, through a great deal of perseverance, some great financial support from the Kelmarsh Wind Farm Benefit (KWCB) and work by a group of the FoHF volunteers, we have made it happen. Progress with the installation started with preparing the base (photo1) followed by delivery of the wooden gazebo structure (photo 2). The delivery of the gazebo to site was 'observed' by the flock of sheep in Little Hill. (\*photo on Page 5\*).

The professional fitters installed the structure within a day and the completed Education Centre can be seen on photo 3. Finally, some handmade gates (courtesy of Mick Higgins) were fitted mainly to stop the sheep using it as a 'cosy sheep pen' to shelter from the wind and rain! Since the installation, there have been





many positive comments made about the facility. We really hope that it will be used by as many people as possible, not only for its educational purpose, which might include use as an outside classroom or a base for field studies or bird watching. but also for people to stop and rest or shelter when walking. We intend to install interpretive displays and a blackboard where sightings can be noted. Several groups, including school, Stepping Stones and a Sunday forest school have all expressed interest and we hope that more individuals or groups will come to recognise the value as the word spreads. When things improve and Covid restrictions are lifted, we hope to have some topical talks by our very own village naturalist, Jules Howard.

In the meantime, and in these uncertain times, please used Haddon Fields as much as you can and enjoy the space to exercise both your body and mind!

# Become a 'Friend of Haddon Fields"!


It is fantastic news that Haddon Fields now has the Education Field Centre sitting so majestically in Great Hill with the location providing a wonderful and expansive view over the fields.

Great news of course, but we now estimate that the cost of maintaining the Friends of Haddon Fields Education Centre and the surrounding area will be up to £500 every year. Over 2/3rds of this amount is the cost of the insurance that we are required to have in order to allow public use of the centre. In addition, we will also incur costs for the upkeep or repairs required in future.

Plus of course we want to develop the site further to encourage more interest in wildlife and biodiversity - vital aspects for our future of all. We had hoped that we could hold fundraising events during the year, but clearly this is not possible under the current Covid-19 regulations.

#### So how can you help?

One way is to make a donation, or another way is to become a 'Friend of Haddon Fields' yourself. The suggested cost is £5 per person or £10 per family. What would you get in return? # Village Hall update

With no sign of government advice and guidelines around the number of people who can safely meet indoors changing any time soon, the hall will remain closed until the end of the year at least. All our user groups have either cancelled their meetings or moved online or outdoors where possible. We are grateful for government support through a grant which recognised that our forced closure would mean a complete loss of income but ongoing overheads to meet. Reopening will take a great deal of effort, not least the cleaning after prolonged closure, but we will start preparing for this as soon as the tide turns in favour of indoor gatherings.

Although the hall remains closed, the car park is becoming a popular venue on Mondays when the mobile eco shop 'Back to Basics' visits (see Page 2 for details).Behind the scenes we are continuing to refine the plans for developing the hall. We had hoped to have an open day in the autumn to share the latest plans but that hasn't been possible so instead we've been canvassing opinion via email, focusing on the regular user groups. There wasn't space in this issue but in the next issue we are hoping to show you two alternative options - one which retains the current footprint but upgrades the heating, electrics, toilets and kitchen and a second option which involves front and rear extensions to reorganize the internal space and create desirable outdoor areas. We have already used the feedback gathered from the previous two open days to arrive at these options and, following a further consultation and decision in the spring, we plan to progress with grant applications and other fundraising in 2021 to enable the re-development in 2022.

Thanks to a KWCB grant, the village hall now owns an electric piano and amplifier. It is available for performances, rehearsals, or to be borrowed personally by any competent keyboard player in the village for up to two weeks at a time. There is no charge to hire the equipment but you must have adequate insurance to cover its transportation, storage and any accidental damage. # **Thrill of a Lifetime**

Jo and I have been married for 60 years our anniversary falling on the 24th September. Jo's gift to me was a flight in a Spitfire! Astonishing. The aircraft was based at Sywell, it was built in time to take part as air cover during the D-day landings and was credited with a kill, when shooting down an enemy aircraft over Omaha beach. After the war it was completely restored by Supermarine Swift and later bought by an enthusiast who added a second cockpit to this magnificent single seater fighter.

I arrived at Sywell to be briefed on the major do's and don'ts for the flight. Was fitted out with a flying suit and a helmet which had a radio link to the pilot. Later I was fitted out with my parachute having been shown a short film clip on how and when to use it. I was introduced to my pilot and taken to the Spitfire, and with a little help from the ground crew climbed into my own cockpit - a tight fit with a parachute strapped to my back. The pilot having asked me where I lived fired up the Rolls Royce Merlin engine in a cloud of smoke and we taxied round to the runway. I was very moved to see so many people turn out and wave as we made our second pass over the village.

# **Clipston Half Trail**



With the 2019 trail run having been successful and a lot of lessons learned it seemed that in putting on the event in 2020 we would be able to draw on the same plans those we had devised for the 2019 event. Of course as we all know the COVID-19 pandemic and the surrounding uncertainty made life much more difficult. Fortunately most of the marshals we had in place in 2019 came forward again and were willing to marshal in the same post as the previous year. Those marshals we had lost had become poacher turned gamekeeper and were now running in this year's event. As well as marshalling the course we had to contend with the problem of being able to arrange a start for 150 runners whilst operating within the social distancing guidelines. Race Harborough in conjunction with Public Health Northampton had determined that the start needed to be in waves and wave marshals and car parking marshals would be needed to ensure that everyone got off safely. A two car park strategy and a carefully choreographed

system of waves of 5 runners was put in place with the runners being shepherded to the start where they would receive an electronic tag and be started off at 10 second intervals. All of this worked very well with the runners being highly respectful of the efforts of the both the start marshals and of the social distancing measures.

Recruiting the marshals in 2019 was an interesting task given that the majority of those approached or those who came forward had little no experience of a running event and were in effect being asked to go and stand in the middle of a field for a long period of time. The reality is that by being a marshal you are very much part of the event, giving words of encouragement and applause to the runners as well drinks (in 2019) and any number of other little things that make the grueling 13 mile race that

little but more pleasant for the runner, the runners in turn express their gratitude as they pass by. This I'm sure led to those marshals from 2019 being happy to marshal again this year. We were witness to some fantastic performances from the runners with the winning time being a very impressive 1hour 25 minutes but no less impressive was the sight of all the runners each trying to achieve their own goals. As the final runner crossed line and the gazebos, signage and tables started to be packed away we had to conclude that regardless of the COVID-19 restrictions it had been another successful event and plans were already being discussed for a 2021 event.

- Currently only 2% of people are registered as stem cell donors (upper age limit 55-60yrs). So more people are urgently needed to join the registry.



# **Clipston Profile: Jude Wilford**



"I just love sheep," says Jude Wilford, somewhat surprisingly considering she's the owner of Clipston Riding School and spends most of her days with horses. In the short time I was chatting to Jude about her life, it became clear that this is a woman who lives for animals - of all sorts - not just the horses she also clearly adores.

A familiar face around the village (usually leading a horse or two), Jude is a great example of someone who lives her life guided by her passions. Growing up in Little Oxendon as part of the Gowling farming family, it is easy to see where this passion has come from. The eldest of three children, Jude led a very happy, outdoorsy childhood, surrounded by animals, helping her mother with the rearing of cade lambs, and the calves that were part of the family's dairy herd. "I was always very animal obsessed" she says "I'm not sure what the teachers made of me at Clipston School. I spent most of my time dreaming about being on the farm with the cows and sheep. I always knew I'd do something to do with animals, so school wasn't a big priority for me!" Her love of horses was also nurtured as a child - she has fond memories of "riding all day, every day" with a friend from East Farndon, exploring the villages, lanes and bridleways of this area. With her farming background and a huge love of animals, it was therefore not surprising that Jude ended up as a smallholder. In 1994, she came to Naseby Road and the land which is now her paddocks and riding school. "It was just arable land at the time. I'd always fancied dairy farming, but Naseby Road wasn't the place for that, so beef cattle, sheep and horses it was!"

Jude had already spent a lot of time working with horses and had a young pony she'd broken in and was training. "Someone asked me if I could teach their child to ride. My pony was the right size, so I said yes and soon word spread that I was giving lessons." It was the beginning of the riding school that has been the backbone of Jude's life ever since. "I really enjoy helping people to understand animals and build relationships with them" she says. "It's the loveliest thing to see kids who I've taught, go on to buy their own horses and compete, or take up veterinary careers."

Jude's ability to train young horses is still a big part of her life. She may still have a love of sheep (she always has between 50-200 in her fields), but she's definitely a horse whisperer. Her relationship with horses is so intuitive and seeing her with 8-year-old Inopinado, it was easy to recognise a very close bond. As she predicted when she was at school, she's built just the kind of life she wanted for herself; surrounded by animals and close to her family. She's exactly where she wants to be. "I'm very lucky" she says.

### **Flower Club**

If asked, 'Which is your favourite flower? 'I would say, 'This is as ridiculous a question as asking which is your favourite child?' There are numerous flowers which fill my heart with joy and the glorious Hellebores with their show of delicate blooms in the winter months does this in spades. I was a novice gardener when we came to Clipston in 1979. Margaret Tear, who many of you will remember, was an enthusiastic gardener with a love for Hellebores, and when she gifted me a couple of her plants, I was off with my collection.

Hellebores, originating from Europe and Asia, are herbaceous perennials and flower from mid-winter to early spring. The variety of flower colour and form is wide, some have single-petalled blooms, and others are deeply cupped or ruffled, with flowers in shades of pink, yellow/cream, white, green



and purple. They provide an invaluable supply of nectar and pollen to honey bees and other insects foraging on sunny winter days.

### **Cultivation and Care**

Best planted in early spring, Hellebores grow well in most aspects - shade or semi shade, and I have some growing successfully in full sun. They are mostly trouble free but some varieties are prone to leaf spot, controlled by cutting off the affected leaves which should not be added to the compost heap.

# Thrills of the open road!!

Clipston Racing and Performance Club has eight members who enjoy driving in open top cars that have a bit of go and good looks. Lyn and Brian Townend, Rosemary and Jim Tyson, Maggie and John Oldershaw and Sue and Jack Balderson. During lockdown through a series of zoom meetings it was decided that a trip down to Suffolk would be very welcome once restrictions were eased. Therefore on a fine sunny morning early in September four cars with roofs down set of for Woodbridge. Sue and Jack in the lead car were given the task of getting us there without going on the A14 or major roads. They did an admirable job although their sat nav and phone maps decided enough was enough and went on strike as the navigators were determined to ignore their routes. I think "make a u turn " is now imprinted on Sue's phone screen. We did make the hotel! The next morning found us visiting the wonderful Sutton Hoo centre near to Woodbridge. What a truly amazing place it is, first unearthed in the late 1930's. Principally the burial site of seven century local Anglo Saxon king Raedwald and his family. Not just your ordinary grave



Cut back the leathery leaves when flowers and new foliage begin to emerge, and mulch with well-rotted compost or manure each year. They eventually grow into beautiful large clumps but do not like being split or moved once established. Hellebores have a difficult time standing up in water. To help towards success with your arrangements, before cutting it is important to wait until the flowers have been pollinated, the stamens shed, seeds pods developed and the flowers beginning to mature. To condition before arranging, first strip off any leaves which would be beneath the water in your container. Place around 2cm of each cut stem into boiling water for 30 seconds, then plunge into cold water for a few hours or overnight in a cool place. Alternative to boiling is to hold the cut end in a candle flame for 30 seconds before the water treatment.

I recently read this simple and apparently successful recipe for the conditioning water for Hellebore flowers, which I will try this winter. Proportions are.... 2 tablespoons of alcohol and a packet of flower food per 1 litre of cold water. Another way to admire the flowers is 'floating'. Cut the stems very short and float them en mass in a shallow bowl of cold water. To avoid the blooms becoming waterlogged, cut circles of fine bubble wrap smaller than the heads, pierce the wrap centrally and post the flower stem though before floating them on the water. I hope I have inspired you to grow these brilliant winter beauties and use them to decorate your home. With very best wishes to everyone on behalf of The Flower Club.
