Church Wildlife Area Update

Following on from the last edition of the Courier we would like to share our proposals for the wildlife area in the churchyard: In order to maximise opportunities for plants and animals to thrive, the churchyard be divided into 3 areas:

Area A to the south – To retain as an area of permanent close-mown grass.

Area B to the east and north – To maintain this as an area of permanent short grass which is valuable for low-growing species such as mouse-ear hawkweed, self-heal or hoary plantain. Grass to be cut every 2-3 weeks allowing for adjustments to ensure that important species are able to flower and seed.

Area C to the west – To remain an area of permanent long grass to provide shelter, food and overwintering sites for invertebrates and other small animals such as frogs, lizards, field voles, etc. The area proposed has mainly very old graves and houses the compost heap and fallen stick store which already provide habitats for creatures. To prevent scrub invasion this area should be sub-divided into three sections with a

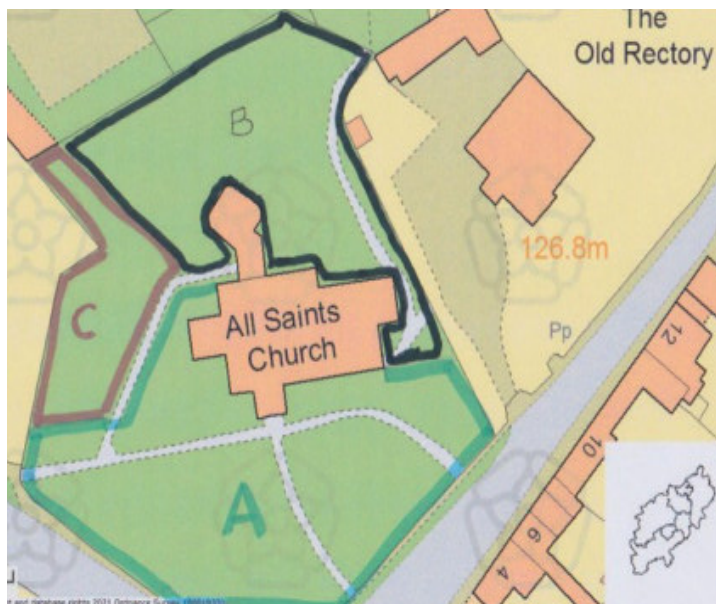
different section being cut in autumn each year in rotation. Cuttings should be removed. Two benches to be provided, one in or adjacent to area C. Ideally we hope to get sponsorship for these from local people. A small water feature be constructed within area C as habitat for aquatic creatures, and information boards be installed to let people know what we are doing. Bat boxes are already in place and we hope to erect bird boxes at strategic points as well.

The village will be invited to comment on the proposals and get involved in the planning and construction process. In particular we would like to have input from the school, Friends of Haddon Fields, and

local naturalists whether amateur or professional. An early part of the project will require a detailed professional survey, recording what plants and animals are there now.

This will act as a baseline from which we can manage progress over time. It is hoped to be able to start on the project by spring 2022. Costs should be minimal especially if we can organise a team of people to manage and work on the site. Grants are available should major costs be incurred and as stated, it is hoped to be able to attract sponsorship for some of the features.

"They really nailed the vaccine programme, and it just got me thinking about Israeli food. I bought a cookbook from Amazon, and shawarma just leapt out at me – it ticked all the boxes. A bit different, easy to make in the shack, perfect for outdoor dining – and most importantly it tastes good!"

The summer ahead looks set to be a good one, and the pub can't wait to get back to normal again. "We're so looking forward to the future and welcoming everyone back properly. We've had so much support and we again want to say an enormous heartfelt thank you to the whole village. You've honestly been amazing." “The inspiration for this project for Clipston came from a similar idea that appeared on the Naseby Facebook page. Filled with enthusiasm, I shared the proposal with Stephen Woodgate and his response was ‘another project for the seniors in the village’ but agreed it was something we should do. So, after ordering over 600 seeds (4 different varieties) and 100 little yellow packets, making the labels and printing the planting instructions, we were ready, over the course of several hours, to put everything together.

We had four distribution locations around the village where folks could pick their ‘FREE’, yes, ‘FREE’, packets of seeds from (lots of folks were offering a donation but we insisted that none was required). Within five days all the 100 packets of seeds were gone! So, we are both looking forward to seeing lots of sunflowers around Clipston from late July until possibly October. 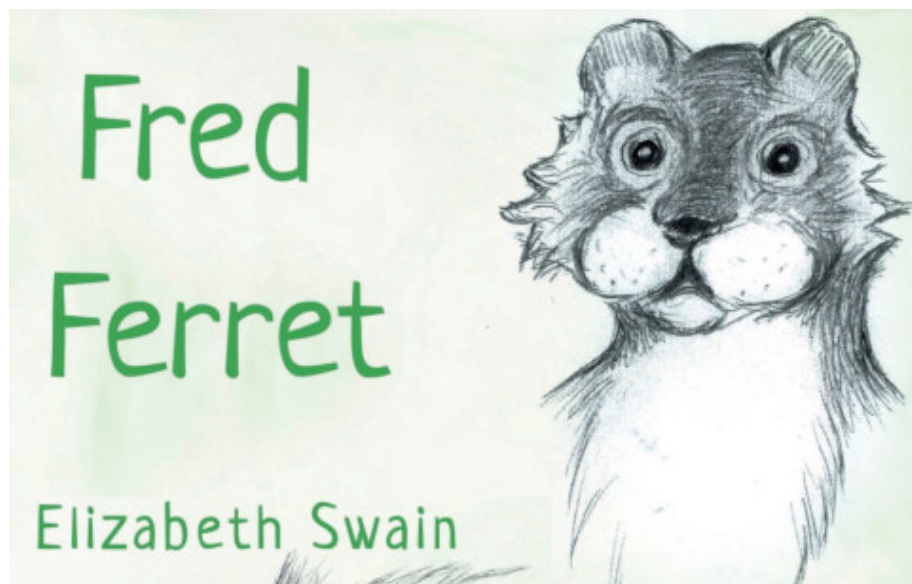

Clipston Village Hall Is Back Open (And Covid Secure)!

After 14 months of closure, we were pleased to reopen as a polling station on 6th May and for bookings on the 17th May. In preparation, the hall was professionally deep cleaned and crockery dishwasher to ensure everything was hygienically clean for reopening. A one-way system is in place and there is plenty of signage to guide users on how to use the space responsibly ensuring the venue remains covid secure. Farming Update

At time of writing it's just rained! As you walk around you'll see this was desperately needed. Grass has not been growing as it usually does in the spring which means that cattle have only just been turned out and fresh grass was getting short for the many ewes and lambs. Winter cereals planted last autumn don't look too bad but the spring-sown crops have either not germinated or look very sad. Some moisture should help.

The cold, dry weather here and adverse weather affecting cereal crops in the US and Ukraine amongst other countries is contributing to a rapid rise in grain prices now and for next harvest. Expect your bread and beer to get more expensive! The post-Brexit trade arrangements are still causing difficulties for food exports. 90% of UK lamb exports go into the EU and hopefully things will become clearer and easier otherwise UK sheep farmers could well be facing lower prices. Could be good news for the BBQ season though! It's forever interesting to me how our local surrounding farming is so affected by world events. Listening to the radio on first bank holiday Monday there seemed to be endless concern about the rain spoiling the holiday and not a word about the benefits the rain brings. It raises the issue again about whether it matters that, in general, people have become somewhat removed from how and where our food is produced.

Stepping Stones



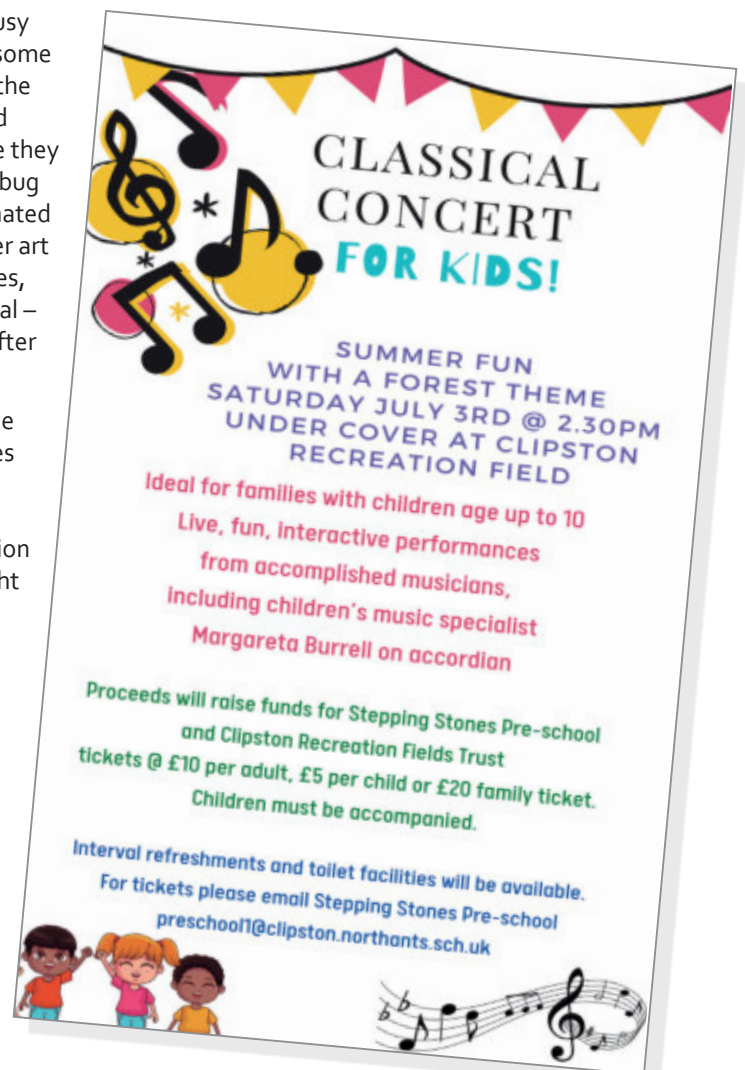

All Saints' Church Clock

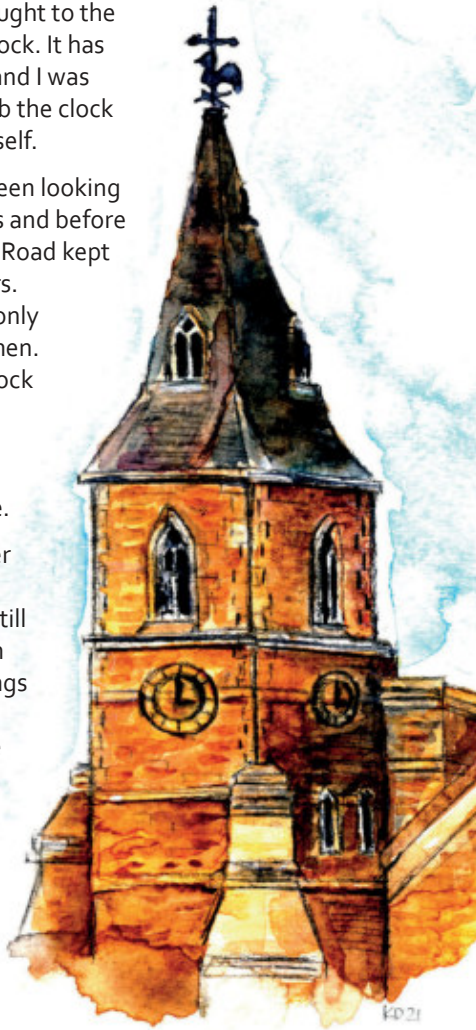
I wonder how many people give thought to the workings of our wonderful church clock. It has been a feature for nearly 200 years and I was delighted when I was invited to climb the clock tower to see how it all works for myself.

David Wilford from Church St. has been looking after the clock for the past few years and before that Arthur Butlin from Harborough Road kept the clock going for a number of years.

The clock was installed in 1884 and only 5 people have looked after it since then. All their names are written on the clock housing. The clock itself is housed in a wooden box with a pitched roof to protect it from damp and especially from pigeons who like to roost there.

The mechanism is a traditional tower clock made by Gillett and Son of Croydon in Surrey. The company is still operating and their mechanisms can be found in many prestigious buildings around the world. It is based on a cast-iron frame and is a masterpiece of English over-engineering in brass and steel.

There are large cogs and a massive escape mechanism and as you can imagine it exudes a sense of quiet stateliness. That is until the striking mechanism clicks in when the sound of the clock bell fills the little chamber.



Until comparatively recently it was necessary to wind the clock manually every week but now thankfully an electric motor has been installed to ensure that the clock doesn't stop. However, as David pointed out, when we have a power cut of more than a minute or so, he has to go up there and start it up again!

As mentioned in the previous Courier, work is urgently needed to the church spire and provided we can afford it, we would like to refurbish the clock faces at the same time. So, the next time you hear the church clock chiming give a thought to our Victorian clockmakers and David who looks after it.

It's great to see the sheep and lambs back in Haddon Fields this spring and many thanks to all the dog owners who have kept their dogs on a lead; particularly important with young lambs gambolling around the fields. It's lovely to see the field centre being used by people in the village now that some of the Covid restrictions are easing. If you would like to use it for an event please let me know!

We are working with the Woodland Trust to set aside the corner of the field near to the field centre so that it can return to a more natural, wild habitat. It will be fenced (with a gateway to prevent sheep grazing). Among other ideas, we hope to establish beetle banks, bug hotels and other features to encourage wildlife and increase biodiversity. Being close to the field centre will allow some studies, such as surveying, to take place on a regular basis. Friends of Haddon Fields would welcome more volunteers to join the small group of 'Friends' with the jobs that need doing. Some of the regular jobs include;

Trimming vegetation and laying bark pathways

Removal of plastic guards as the trees mature

Improving biodiversity by building beetle banks, bug hotels, bird boxes

Maintenance of the field centre - treating the wood

Helping with educational activities or workshops

If you would you like to volunteer, please get in touch with me. Please put Sunday September 12th in your diary! With fingers firmly crossed that we will be back to something like 'normal', we will be holding an afternoon of events highlighting all the activities in Haddon Fields, led by Jules Howard and team. 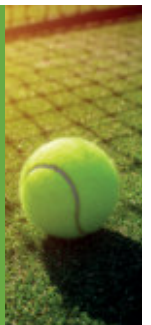
Clipston Tennis Club Joins Local League

Clipston Profile: Christina Faull

Christina Faull has lived in Clipston with her family for 16 years and is a doctor specialising in palliative care. She works at the LOROS hospice in Glenfield, Leicester, which put her right on the frontline in the spring of 2020.

She talked to me about her journey into her chosen career, her experience of Covid 19 and how she copes with the emotional challenges of her job.

"When I was about eight, I used to watch my dad doing operations on sheep," Christina says, recalling her childhood growing up on the Wirral. "He was a teaching vet and sometimes took me to work with him. He was always encouraging me to ask the question why?" These early experiences fostered a love of science, which eventually led to her studying medicine at Newcastle University.

Soon after qualifying as a doctor, she spent 18 months working in New Zealand, followed by a stint at a missionary hospital in Papua New Guinea. "A lot of the work was completely terrifying," she remembers, referring to her experience as a flying doctor, treating tribal people who had very little contact with the outside world.

"I wasn't familiar with a lot of the illnesses, so had to look things up in a book to see if I could do it, knowing that if I didn't help them, they'd die anyway. I felt completely useless, but I learned a lot."

Returning to Newcastle, she threw herself into the gruelling schedule of a junior doctor, working punishing hours on the wards.

"I would sometimes start work at 8am on Friday, and finish at 6pm Monday, having had possibly no sleep in that time," she remembers. Describing this as 'hard' seems woefully inadequate, although many people would consider her later specialism in palliative care to be even harder. Her decision to move into this area was partly because it combined her interest in both the psychological and physical aspects of medicine, but also because she felt very strongly that she wanted to help people in those very hard months and weeks before they die. When I asked how she deals with this, she talks about being pretty good at intellectualising things and reflecting on her work without getting too emotionally involved. "I've requested counselling at certain points," (which is offered to all doctors) "but mostly it's about having my own strategies for coping with things". She admits it does sometimes get to her though; "There are some people who do stay with you."

Over the last year, Covid 19 has presented even more challenges. Having moved more into training and research, Christina was required to return to the ward in March 2020 to help with the pandemic (40% of her hospice colleagues contracted Covid 19, leading to staff shortages). "The biggest impact was not being able to allow visitors" she says. "It was difficult getting used to the PPE and new procedures, but for us doing a good job means doing it well for the family, so that bit was really tough." They did their best though - use of iPads and even staff phones were employed to ensure that patients could keep in touch with their friends and family.

Making a difference is incredibly important to Christina, both as a doctor and in other areas of her life. She enjoys community work and has recently got involved with the Clipston WI. Early in 2021, (inspired by her recollection of HIV quilts which were made during the AIDS epidemic of the 1980s) she set about galvanising the residents of Clipston to record their thoughts and experiences of Covid by creating a quilt of individually-made squares (see page 9). It was a cathartic thing for villagers, but I'm guessing it was cathartic for Christina herself too. Her idea has helped to create a tangible collection of memories from this time, which will be a little piece of history for villagers of the future. It must be said that in whatever she does, Christina Faull proves herself to be quite a remarkable woman.

Battersea Dogs' Home Founder Has Clipston Connection

FOOD and Shelter are required every day for thousands of Lost Dogs and Cats rescued from the streets and starvation. All Animals are kept seven days, to enable

owners to regain their property; new homes are found for unclaimed animals, or they are mercifully put to death.

HELP IS URGENTLY NEEDED.



While researching a non-fiction book about dogs, I came across a rather lovely little piece of Clipston history that I thought I'd share on these pages. It relates to the Revd Edward Bates, appointed headmaster of Clipston School in 1844 - he apparently went on to become master of the medical school at Clipston in 1856.

At around this time, Bates, who apparently lived with his father in Kelmash, took in his sister who had become estranged from her husband. She lived there for a time, finding her feet before moving to London. In 1860, Edward followed. The family had plans... Edward's sister was none other than Mary Tealby, the founder of "The Temporary Home for and Starving Dogs" (which would become Battersea Dogs' Home). Tealby's building really was quite something for its time. Within years, it would play home to as many as 12,500 dogs— some (but by no means all) re-homed among London's newly brimming bourgeois. There was nothing like it in the world. Mary Tealby herself was something of a cultural enigma: a powerful, committed, energetic female campaigner in the mould of Emmeline Pankhurst or Francis Cobbe.

Charles Dickens, particularly, was a keen supporter and ally and even Queen Victoria ended up re-homing a dog from the institution.

Perhaps Mary's brief presence in and around Clipston is well known in the "I-remember-when-this-was-all-fields"

demographic (!) but I was certainly pleasantly surprised and honoured to find out that we share, perhaps only fleetingly, a home patch with such illustrious company.

Neighbourhood Development Plan

Following on from the Courier's last edition update of the NDP, the West Northamptonshire Council (previously called Daventry District Council) has now received comments from the general public and statutory consultees on its latest form and related documents previously uploaded onto the West Northamptonshire Council's website.

These latest comments have also been uploaded on to the council website. There are 12 sets of comments which, we are advised, is slightly fewer than the average number the council would expect. As stated in the last Courier, an independent examiner (agreed between the Parish Council and the West Northamptonshire Council) will now be appointed and upon final approval, it will be put to Clipston parish residents for the yes/no referendum.

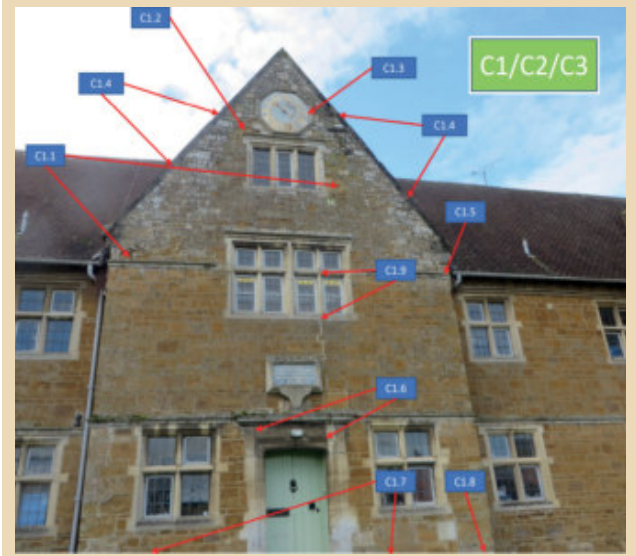

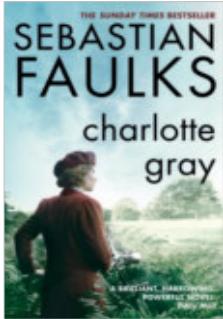

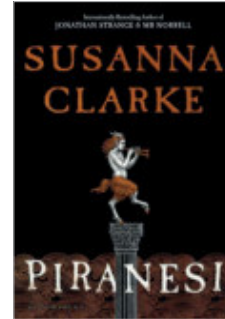

The last of Faulks's French trilogy. It is the most inward-looking of the three books, dealing with themes of memory and loss.



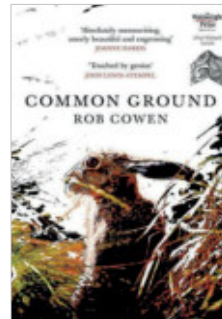

A new novel featuring forensic archaeologist Dr. Ruth Galloway solving another mystery. Great story lines leaving you wanting more.



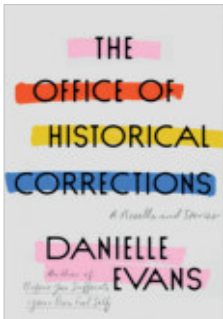
Katy Dynes - 'Piranesi'

A compelling and extraordinary fantasy novel containing an amazing story within a story.



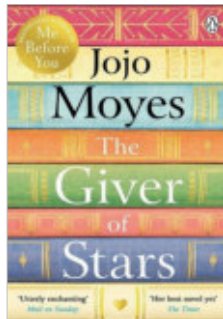
Julia Blake - 'Shuggie Bain'

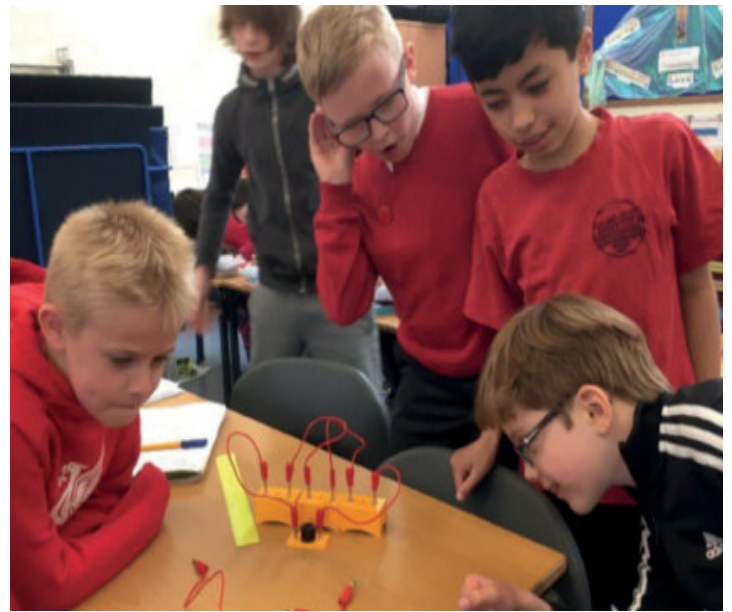
Clipston Primary School
