Memorial Lamp

Some of you will recall the previously leaning memorial lamp on the village green. Here is a photographic reminder (try to ignore the red car) which shows the problem. No, it's not the houses in the background leaning the other way; be serious please.

Apart from the quirky lean, the lamp was provided with funds by the village in 1953 in recognition of those who served in the First and/or Second World Wars, and inscribed as such, so there were compelling reasons for it to be restored. Accordingly, a grant was applied for - and received - from the Kelmarsh Windfarm Community Benefit fund and expert contractors were employed. It was a tricky job and with the additional benefit of a huge village team effort the lamp was un-tilted, cleaned and the metalwork painted. Particular thanks go to:

The Recreation Field continues to be busy; it's great to see so many people using the space for many different outdoor activities!

We had an extremely successful outdoor concert for families with young children organised mainly by the Stepping Stones team; they are excellent to

work with and the whole event ran very smoothly. I'd also like to thank Robert Burnham for his help - without him events like these would not take place. Robert does a lot of other volunteering work and CRFT really appreciate his time with us. A final thank you, with regard to the concerts, is to the musicians. I know he's my brother and all that but for Chris to organise his professional musical friends and all the music is a big job and it's much appreciated! Long may they continue to enjoy their various musical reunions here and elsewhere!

The impact of the popularity of the playing field has meant that we have had to increase the amount of maintenance we need to carry out. We have an annual inspection for RoSPA each year and they had identified the increased wear in the surface of the young children's play area as a concern. We are now working with an excellent playground maintenance company who have installed all the new rubber mulch and the new basket swing.

Farming September 2021

With so much changing with regard to how society views the British countryside I thought I'd try to write about some of the factors uppermost in many people's minds.

British farms have drastically reduced in number and increased in size. Anyone who's been to many parts of the South West and other parts of the UK on holiday will see that the farms that used to be family businesses and a way of life are now converted to holiday accommodation. The farms that remain have had to get bigger to get the economies of scale, to reduce their costs, so that they can compete in the world market for producing food.

When I began working on farms in the 1970s a tractor was about the same size as the four-wheel drive vehicles we now see driving around our lanes. The wheelbase of this Fordson is just over 2 metres.





Farm vehicles are now fantastic bits of very high-tech kit specialising in the field tasks they are designed for, covering much more ground in a day and being far more precise than in the past, resulting in less waste and reducing potential adverse environmental effects. Everything is now fully computerised and much of the field work is GPS controlled. Not only that but now these vehicles even have air conditioning – we simply had to adjust our temperature with clothes!

While the actual details of the new trade deal that the UK government have made with the Australian government are still not published, there's likely to be an impact on UK farmers.



One example is that Australia has a massive beef industry with larger farms than in the UK and with production methods not approved of for UK food production, including the use of growth hormones. This could mean that Australian beef could be cheaper than ours as they have lower production costs. This will put greater pressure on smaller UK beef producers and may drive more out of business. This same concern is felt by sheep farmers here.

No doubt the detail of the agreement will eventually make things clearer but one thing we could all do to help British farmers, irrespective of any trade deal, is to not buy Australian produced meat that's travelled half-way around the world!


The Orbell café which had to stop at the first lockdown has continued to run on Zoom every week and has provided a useful lifeline for information and to have a natter!

We have applied for a grant to enable us to buy a set of bistro tables and chairs to improve the flexibility and atmosphere at the café when we re-open in September. The Reverend Miranda and Father Kris have run a reality version of the café at the village hall recently when the mobile shop is there on Wednesdays.

The last edition of the Courier reported on the problems we have with the spire and especially the weathervane. Things have moved on and we have been fortunate to receive a generous donation from a supporter of the church which will enable us to do the work as soon as the Diocese give us planning permission. There is also excellent news about the planned wildlife area in the churchyard as mentioned in the last issue. The Diocese have approved our plans but without the inclusion of a water feature which we were very keen to include. However it does mean that we will be able to install the benches and grassland management as proposed. We will now be

looking to set up a management group to make sure that anyone from the village who would like to be involved with the project is able to do so.

And finally, we are planning to set up a group of people to plan and manage fund raising and works to the fabric of the church. We are looking for people who are interested in seeing our beautiful grade 1 listed building kept in good condition and would be prepared to meet a few times a year to plan fund raising and determine how funds might best be used. You don't have to be an active church member but have skills in fund raising, architecture, building, planning etc. Please contact me on **525120** if you think you might be interested.


News from Clipston Primary School

As the school year came to the end of what has been "quite a ride", we were very fortunate to remain relatively unscathed by the rising Covid infection rate and were relieved that there were no Bubble closures this term, and that the usual rites of passage, particularly our Year 6 Leavers, were able to go ahead, although not in quite the usual way.

Our youngest children celebrated the end of their first year at school with a special ceremony to present them with all their school photographs from their Reception Year. The Year 6 Leavers' Service was again a "virtual" event. Each pupil recorded special memories of their time at Clipston School and the whole school sang the Leavers' Song. It is lovely to know that being at Clipston School gives children life-long, happy memories - one pupil even voiced thanks to their parents for choosing to send them to Clipston Primary! Trophies were awarded to Auden for English, Henry for Maths, Bella for Effort & Perseverance and Freya for Sportsmanship. During their last Assembly, Year 6 were shown a book presented for Arithmetic to Mary Henderson when she left Clipston Grammar School in 1939 and they were fascinated to see that it was signed the then Head Master, Earnest Halestrap, after whom one of our School Houses is named. Year 6 were also presented with their Leavers' Bibles, with a Blessing offered by Rev. Miranda, and afterwards they celebrated with cake and chocolate treats.







We were sadded to hear the news that Irene Allen died recently. Irene worked as a Teaching Assistant alongside me in the Reception Class for over ten years and after she retired, she became one of our Sewing Volunteers for several years. Many, many children in the Infants will have worn at least one of the Nativity Costumes she made, some of which are still in use.

Irene will always be part of Clipston School's rich history and we send our condolences to her family.

Irene Christina Allen 10.07.1940 - 2.07.2021

It seems fitting that I should write a few words about Irene, a dear friend and neighbour, who lived and took an active part in Clipston village life for 35 years.

Irene, her husband, Stan, and 2 boys came to Clipston from Tysoe, Warks, when the houses in Chestnut Grove were new. She was a very practical person, actually liking woodwork and was an excellent sewer, knitter and baker. As well as running the home Irene used her skills at Clipston school, assisting Emma Mercer in the reception class where, as Emma says she, "anticipated what needed to be done and intuitively was on it" before Emma said a word.

After retirement she led the Wednesday sewing sessions; her reconditioning of props and costumes was legendary and long-lasting, proven by the fact they're still in use to this day! She took delight and interest in seeing all the children grow and develop, especially of course her own 3 grandsons, who still talk of their visits to see Nanny in Clipston. She even found time to belong to the WI, Flower Club and help Linda Lake with the admin and costumes for her keep-fit classes. Irene was a good listener – she offered wise advice if asked and great support and understanding when needed. Stoical in the face of personal tragedy, after losing her son Chris, and uncomplaining as her eyesight began to fail. At the end of 2015, in order to maintain her independence, Irene moved back to Tysoe - a village with more amenities.

An all-round "good egg" who enriched the lives of all who knew her, Irene's favourite poem was "Leisure" by the Welsh poet, W H Davies –

"What is life, if full of care, we have no time to stand and stare..."

Let us take a leaf out of Irene's book to appreciate the beauty around us and take time to remember those that pass through it. Rest in Peace, Irene.

The Lilies of the Field - SEW

I know that older people, of whom I am one, often seem to go on about 'the good old days'. Of course they were not all good, but for much of our wildlife they were conspicuously better. So much so that earlier this year a parliamentary committee published a report for the Government with the title 'Biodiversity: Bloom or Bust': in other words nature must be allowed to flourish again or

the title 'Biodiversity: Bloom or be allowed to flourish again or almond trees already hav

it will collapse. What does this mean for Clipston? What used to be better?

The report describes what has been lost: the numbers of wildflower meadows, ponds, insects, birds and animals and what could happen if we ignore what is taking place. There used to be flocks of lapwings on the playing field; there were far more swallows and swifts visiting in the summer; our car windscreens and number plates used to be covered in dead insects, and some of the stretches of verges even had cowslips in the spring. These examples are obviously connected; without so many varied flowers we have fewer insects, many of which we rely on to pollinate our crops. And without enough insects to feed on: fewer birds. Recent research has shown that arable fields with beetle banks and edged with



wildflowers are threatened by pesticides. Even allowing wildflowers to grow in pastures with cattle - traditional meadows in fact - can benefit the health of the animals (BBC 'Farming Today', 24th July). And we know that without insects the food chain cycle will break down, as it has in parts of China, where some of the fruit and almond trees already have to be pollinated by hand.

> Considering all this, what can Clipston do to help the situation? Could you allow even a small patch of garden (if you have one) to grow a few 'weeds', or some long grass? We don't like nettles much, but some butterflies rely on them to lay their eggs. Butterflies like thistle flowers too, and goldfinches love the seeds. I'm not suggesting a wilderness, but patches for the creatures which help sustain us, and in the case of butterflies - who are such a pleasure to watch in the summer – these areas are essential. More obviously, must we mow down all the verges? Where tall grasses and flowers affect visibility, safety must come first, but there are some verges where this is not an issue. Cow Parsley (Queen Anne's lace), Meadowsweet, Red Campion - these all grow along our verges in summer and are

surely attractive enough to be in any herbaceous border. Even the humble dandelion feeds the bees early in the season. While we take this plant for granted Singaporeans are now desperate to collect its seeds and grow it for its bright yellow flowers and the vitamin content of the leaves. And there is good news for all these wildflowers, and for less tidy gardeners: The Royal Horticultural Society has awarded a gold medal to a garden full of 'weeds' at the Tatton Park Flower Show in Cheshire! The garden is called 'Weed Thriller' and was created by someone who wished to celebrate the beauty of our native wildflowers and weeds.



For well over a year now things have been difficult and unhappy for many people, due to Covid restrictions. In Clipston we appreciate how lucky we are to live in a village surrounded by fields, and to have the kindness of friends and neighbours who offered help, or a socially distanced chat and a smile. All over the country communities are creating memorials for those who have died in the pandemic. Clipston now has it's beautiful quilt, London a wall of hearts, and so on.

It was decided to hold a memorial on the second anniversary of the ending of First World War, the focus of which would be an empty tomb, a so-called Cenotaph in Whitehall. This was duly designed, and, like a stage set, was made of wood and plaster

so that it could be made and destroyed quickly after the ceremony. But so many people came to lay flowers, letters and messages to their departed loved ones that it was agreed to remake the monument in stone. Not everyone could go to London, and so villages have set up their own stone memorials to remember their losses. The thing uniting the whole country on Armistice Day is the small red poppy which flourished on the battlefields in France, despite the destruction. These poppies are natural signs of hope and regeneration.

Could Clipston remember the months of the pandemic with other kinds of flowers: not paper or plastic poppies, but living stretches of verge and patches in Churchyards and gardens, which

will change with the seasons but which will also make sure that there is a healthy future for our wildlife, and therefore for future generations of humanity?

This piece is called 'The Lilies of the Field', not because it's a phrase used in the Bible, but because I think it's the best way to describe our wildflowers and some of our 'weeds'

as natural friends and essential sustainable resources. If we think of them like this we can hope, amid the environmental gloom, that the future will be

kinder to them, and to us.



Neighbourhood Development Plan

In the last edition of the Courier we reported that the comments from the public on the latest form of the Neighbourhood Plan had been uploaded onto the West Northamptonshire Council's website, and that an independent Examiner was to be appointed to finally approve or otherwise the form of the plan, before its submission to the Clipston Parish residents for the yes/no referendum.

The independent examiner (agreed between the West Northamptonshire Council ("WNC") and the Parish Council) has been appointed. The examiner is considering all of the plan documentation and the majority of his report has been completed. Inevitably the examiner has raised queries which have been answered and these queries and the Parish Council's answers will be uploaded onto the WNC website.

The independent examiner may well propose amendments to the Plan. Any such amendments will be available for viewing on the WNC website. Following the conclusion of the Examiner's report and WNC formally approving the plan, a referendum will take place at the village hall, Clipston for the Clipston Parish residents to vote either for or against the adoption of the plan. The referendum process will be managed by WNC and appropriate advertising and notification will be given publicising the referendum process.

Onwards and upwards!

The Village Hall will be celebrating its 50th anniversary next year! Built in 1862 it was originally a Church of England Girls' and Infant School, before becoming the Church Hall in 1928. It was then purchased by the village in 1972 as a village amenity and officially opened in May 1973 by the High Sheriff of Northamptonshire. The building and car park have since seen a number of improvements, thanks to the work of successive management committees and fundraising support from villagers.

Now, almost 50 years on, it is time for a full refurbishment to improve the facilities and activities on offer. At the Open Day in January 2020, the village showed its support and voted overwhelmingly to retain the existing site and building with a view to complete modernisation. Suggestions were made about the size and flexibility of the space and ways to lower its environmental impact. Since then, the committee have been working on two alternative plans for re-development: one to extend into the courtyard at the rear and another to keep the existing footprint. The Covid-19 pandemic stalled any further progress but will help to shape details of the specification. It is hoped it won't be too long before those designs can be shared at another village Open Day, when comments and suggestions will again be welcomed. The aim is that by the time the 50th anniversary rolls around in 2022, the plan will be fixed such that it can continue to serve as a hub for community activity for many more years to come.
