A big thank you to Jim Tyson of Chapel Lane, who took this fantastic bird's eye view of the village for us, using his new drone camera.



Clipston Church News

The past few months have been very challenging for All Saints church here in Clipston. Since our previous vicar Miranda moved on last year we have been working with the other 6 parishes in the benefice and the Diocese of Peterborough to find a replacement. At the time of writing, an advertisement is about to appear in the Church Times so we are hoping to have someone in place by the Summer. As any Facebook users will know, the church has continued to provide services during this period of vacancy and we have been able to do this largely because we have two Lay preachers in the village in Trevor Lake and Valerie Carpenter who have been preparing and providing a variety of services in Clipston and also in the other parishes in the benefice. In addition to the services, they have presided at funerals and other church related events as well as providing home communion for people who are unable to attend church.

The cafe church services run on the second Sunday of each month have been particularly successful and have attracted some people who find the informal nature of these services with the opportunity to discuss key issues of the day over a cup of coffee and a croissant different from traditional formal church services. The vital work to the church spire, clock faces and weather vane has begun, after more than two years having to revise proposals and provide more detailed specifications all of which almost trebled the cost of the work. Many thanks to all those people who helped out with the funding of this work. You know who you are.. Probably worth reminding people that the church receives NO MONEY from the Diocese, the government or anywhere other than from donations and occasionally through grants. Any way that you can help us through regular giving, bequests in wills or one off donations would be so welcomed.

Disappointingly we have decided not to continue with the wildlife area in the churchyard. We received a number of complaints that the uncut grass looked scruffy and so reluctantly we will be cutting all the grass down in future. However the wildlife pond will remain. The frogs and newts will have to cross the cut grass to get there but I am sure they will manage it. The annual cost of maintaining a large grade 1 listed building like our church is massive. The recent hikes in fuel costs have hit us hard and we are now faced with problems with the heating system, parts of which go back to Victorian times.



Forest church for families

Local families are embracing the outdoors to enjoy walks, campfires and child-friendly discussions about Christianity at monthly forest church sessions. These relaxed, informal get togethers meet at venues around Clipston, Sibbertoft and Welford on the third Sunday of the month. They involve a local walk followed by tea and biscuits (and sometimes s'mores round a camp fire). Run by local parents, the group is



fun and welcoming, and provides time out of busy lives to enjoy some time with your family. The sessions are most suitable for children aged 6-14. To find out more or to be added to the WhatsApp group, please contact **Alun Davies on 07875 643822**.

Can you help?

It is fair to say that the church is at a critical point which it has probably faced many times in the past. Those of us running the church are all getting to an age where we will not be able to continue for much longer. During the vacancy a small number of people have been spending much time and effort in making sure that the church is available and clean. Trevor and Valerie are two of those people and they have been spending virtually full working weeks just on church business. They are not paid for this.

In the past as older people have had to back down from these duties, younger people have stepped in to help out and eventually take over. That is how we became involved many years ago.

So this is a heartfelt plea to anyone who might have a bit of spare time at their disposal to come along and help continue ensuring that the church is open, warm and welcoming for another thousand years. The alternative, a closed church which is boarded up and an overgrown churchyard doesn't bear thinking about!

Swing & Sway at the Village Hall

Every Thursday couples from Clipston and surrounding villages meet at the village hall to dance, in fact I should probably say learn to dance! We are coached and encouraged by Teresa, a dance teacher of some 30 years International experience. The classes are fun and we learn a variety of dances from the rhythm FoxTrot to Rock & Roll in a relaxed and non judgemental way. Teresa has a passion for dance and fitness and her aim is to make each session enjoyable for all, 'It is very rewarding to see people come in for the 1st time when they do not know any steps and within 10 minutes they are dancing'. She also runs classes each Monday in the village hall, Dance Fitness 9:30 am -10:15 am (complimentary Tea & Coffee served after class) followed by Strong & Steady 10:30 am -11:15 am. This class is great for anyone who is looking to improve their strength, balance and coordination.



Teresa stresses that she would like to let people know how beneficial it is to keep active and enjoy the benefits of dancing and exercise especially for the over 50s.

Three years ago we had to hire a firm of steeplejacks to remove a buddleia tree which was growing out of the stonework. Whilst they were up there, the steeplejacks pointed out that the weather vane was loose and there were several other issues with stonework and windows that would need to be done by steeplejacks.

Whilst we couldn't afford the scaffolding the original steeplejacks wanted to use, we found Walton steeplejacks from Stoke on Trent who could do the work using just ladders and ropes.

Jake Walton and Scott have taken down the weather vane and at the time of writing it is in a workshop being refurbished and possibly gilded. We decided that whilst they were up there the clock faces should also be refurbished and they too are in the workshop being shot-blasted and re-painted and gilded. They should look terrific when they are replaced and the clock is re-started.

Other works that Jake and Scott are doing include securing the windows to stop birds getting in and repointing the stonework where necessary. Once this is all done we would like to be able to light up the clock face from below and we hope to be able to get public support for this to be done.

Village hall

We are now busy applying for grants, refining the specification and obtaining quotes for the works. There's a huge amount of work involved and we could really do with extra help to lighten the load. Wonderful Walks

Little waterfall – Haselbech Hill Loop from Maidwell (Kamoot)

Distance: 4.6 miles (7.4km) Allow about 1.5 hours for this walk This is an easy yet lovely walk along bridleways, footpaths and quiet country lanes. The map starts the walk in Maidwell by the old Telephone Exchange, however it can be started in Haselbech from the Cottesbrooke Road taking in the magnificent views from Haselbech hill at the start of the walk. A lovely waypoint is the little waterfall by Dale Farm. At this point take the footpath by the farm's main gates. From Clipston to the Med

Last summer, local cycling enthusiasts Jim Mcinulty and Tom Redpath ventured out on a long planned cycle trip through France pedalling from the Brittany coast down to the Med. Having spent the previous few months 'getting in shape' with training rides centred around the Clipston area, the pair set off at the end of June to catch the Thursday overnight channel crossing from Portsmouth. Rolling down the ferry ramps at 7am the next morning into a drizzly St. Malo and fuelled by a Brittany Ferries breakfast it was time to clip in and go for it.

Using the book "France en Velo" by Hannah Reynolds as a rough guide alongside the Kamoot navigation app and some GPX files, the journey kicked off with the coastal road towards Mont Saint-Michel, passing Oyster stalls at Cancale. Turning south it was then into cider making country on quiet back lanes and traffic free roads.

Covering 68 miles on day 1 was a great taster of what was to come, with each day typically rolling through medieval towns and villages such as Fougeres, Hautefort, Brantome and Figeac, past dazzling fields of sunflowers, grazing cattle and crossing wide meandering rivers (Loire and Dordogne to name but two).



Market bought cheese, tomatoes, baguettes and fruit made for an ideal re-fuelling daily lunch sitting on the steps of many a local church whilst observing the laid back pace of local village life and pondering the changing architectural styles and colours.

Opting to ditch the camping route this time, the mid price/ budget hotel stops mostly lived up to their 2-3 star rating with only a couple that were in the 'never again' category. Irrespective, the promise of an end of ride beer on arrival and a shower was a great incentive when the going got tough and the weather really began to heat up.

11 days later, with 10 departments crossed, 750 miles cycled and amazingly zero punctures, the finishing post was in sight with the pyrenees looming to the southwest and the med glinting in the far distance south of Beziers. If you're looking for something more than just a holiday, discovering another country by cycle is definitely an immersive way to travel and makes for an adventure that is truly life affirming.

A Favourite Local Cycle Ride

Clipston, Naseby, Brixworth, Lamport Loop

(Distance: approx.24 miles)



Using mostly quiet roads and taking in some stunning local scenery, this little rollercoaster of a ride is even better on a sunny spring or summers day.

Starting from Clipston, head up Longhold Road towards Sibbertoft and take a left before the village onto Naseby Road/ Dust Hill. Head out of Naseby on the Cottesbrooke Road. Take a left turn onto the Cottesbrooke Estate and continue through and then left on the gated Road to Brixworth. Stop for a coffee at the Workhouse opposite the Co-Op before heading on and through Scaldwell, left to Lamport, right for Draughton, Maidwell, Haselbech then back to Clipston via Naseby. News from Clipston Primary School

It has been another busy term with so many wonderful learning opportunities being enjoyed by children across the school. The School and Eco Council have been working hard to improve the playground with a Litter Pick Day and the planting of bulbs in our Peace Garden. Older pupils thoroughly enjoyed a visit by local Magistrates to learn about their role and the processes of the Magistrates Court. They are looking forward to a trip to Stratford in March, as part of their Shakespeare English Unit. Pupils in Year 5 completed their Bikeability Course, perfecting the skills they need to keep safe when riding on local roads and country lanes.



During Enrichment Day, children across the whole school enjoyed learning about Gaudi, making Gaudi-inspired Spires and Chimneys as part of the Art and Design Architects Unit. Every child also took part in basic First Aid training with the older children all learning CPR. In assemblies this term, themes have included marking Martin Luther King Jnr. Day and Holocaust Remembrance Day, and children articulated thoughtful and insightful comments about these sensitive topics.

In the younger classes, children thoroughly enjoyed a trip to a local farm and were lucky enough to see a lamb being born! They have also made bird feeders to help the local wildlife survive the harsh winter months. Key Stage 1 pupils have been learning about The Victorians and in particular they enjoyed a Victorian School Day which included Mrs Mercer in role as a very strict School Teacher, "slates" to write on and the dreaded Dunce's Hat! A variety of clubs and other opportunities continue to enrich the curriculum with children taking part in Cross Country, Gymnastics, Coding, French, Drama, Science and Basketball Clubs as well as Music Lessons.





Key Stage 2 pupils have had the opportunity to spend a Saturday at Robert Smyth Academy taking part in the Primary Science Conference led by staff from Clipston and other local schools. It's always exciting to explore a "huge" secondary school and see their Science Labs in action! One particular highlight this term, was the Choir Trip to Young

> Voices at the Resorts World Arena in Birmingham. There really is nothing quite like singing your heart out with thousands of other children from across the country in an enormous arena.

As the school year approaches its mid-point, we are looking forward to hosting nearly 70 pupils from Sparkenhoe, our link school in Leicester, in March, including a visit to the church and a walk around the village. World Book Day will be focusing on Bedtime Reading. Every child eagerly awaits their turn to take home the Bedtime Book Bag filled with a selection of stories to share, followed by a Pyjama Day in school when we read some of our favourite books together. Our Easter Service will be in church (9.15am on 31st March) and everyone is welcome, as are visitors to the school from the local community. The Board of Governors is currently seeking to fill a vacancy and anyone interested in volunteering for a few hours each month during term time, should express their interest to the Clerk to the Governors, via the school office: office@clipston.northants.sch.uk. School is open for all children aged 4 to 11 years old from 7.30am each morning (Breakfast Club). Clipston Past & Present

Wellcroft House, Number 1 High Street

Opposite Clipston church between Kelmarsh Road and the entrance to the village hall, is Number 1 High Street, which is known to be Clipston's oldest house. Built in 1575, when Queen Elizabeth I was on the throne, it pre-dates even Clipston school, and displays many interesting visual clues that reveal its history.

The obvious ones are the decorative stone inscriptions or designs set into the stonework of the building. The most intricate of these (picture 1) mentions John Buswell, who was the grandfather of Sir George Buswell, founder of Clipston School.



Current owners of the house, Julia and Andy Blake, tracked down a copy of John's last will and testament, written in 1574 in Latin. The will reveals that he was a wealthy landowner, who left (among many other things) a plot of land described as 'three leas [meadows] in Clipston felde, in Wellcroft corner' to his wife Mary, for the benefit of his son Thomas. Wellcroft Corner was the name of the plot where the house now sits, and the inscriptions suggest that Mary built the house for Thomas shortly after John's death.





The second inscription 1575 T Bus wel (picture 2) supports this theory as we assume it was the date of the build and its first owner, Thomas. Interestingly Andy Blake only uncovered the last three letters of this inscription a few years ago (up until that point is just said T Bus, which was a little more cryptic!). An architect visiting the Blakes around the time they purchased the house in 2004, also threw some



light on the third clue - a diamond-shaped design in the stonework that he described as a widow's lozenge (picture 3). This heraldry represents a widowed woman further proof that the house was built by Mary for son Thomas after John died.

Other visual clues suggest the house was originally bigger, maybe double the width it is today. The stonework

on the left of the building is random rubble rather than cut stone and there's a blocked-up door on the left gable wall which could have been an internal door.

A fourth inscription on the opposite gable end wall reads M E & B 1750, - local history books suggest a Matthew Buswell made changes to the building and was recording his family's contribution.

Over the centuries the house has been occupied by many families, most of whom had the surnames either Buswell, Wilford or Burnham. The last Buswell, Phillip, died a few years ago but there are still Wilford and Burnham families who live in Clipston today.

The Old and the New

Andrew and Jennifer are no strangers to Clipston or the many challenges and rewards that come from the revitalisation of unique and distinctive buildings. Here, they have kindly shared with us a fascinating 'through the keyhole' look into their latest project and 30-year journey.

Since their marriage in April 1993, Andrew and Jennifer have lived in four different homes in Clipston. Living on Kelmarsh Road, Kell's Cottage and moving to 'Hillcrest' on Harborough Road in 2004 with their three girls Amber, Beth and Cate and baby son Jacob. Their time spent at Hillcrest involved renovations and changes that helped to ensure many happy and cherished family memories and no doubt prepared Andrew and Jennifer for the move and work that was to come.

In 2000, Andrew and Jennifer purchased 'the barn' from Rick Percival. The building, circa Mid 19th Century, formed part of farmyard buildings that were the original Chestnut Farm situated on the corner of Gold Street. Whilst the barn had already been converted by Rick during his ownership, it underwent further works in 2000 by Andrew's company, (JWA Architects) who occupied the building from 2000 to early 2021.

In 2019, JWA decided to relocate to Market Harborough and Jennifer and Andrew took the bold step they knew they just had to take! They set about devising a plan of action: to turn the barn from a stylish architect's office into a sleek and welcoming home for their family. The initial planning work began in earnest in 2019, extending through 2020, with the conversion work finally commencing in April 2021.





Having worked in the barn for over 20 years, Andrew reflected on the plan going forward:

'I did not want to feel like I was living in my old office, so we decided to completely demolish and strip out all of the office interior associated with the business, taking the building back to basically four walls and a roof, albeit keeping the historical timbers / structure intact designing a modern home and interior, fit, to work in tandem with the historical timber fabric and the 1980's structural steel frame that effectively keeps the barn external walls in position.'

Andrew and Jennifer shared some of the quirky challenges that unfolded:

'The funny thing was, that you could literally see, if you stood at one end, that it was narrower than the other! ...you could literally see the walls going outwards ... we had problems trying to work out how we were going to do the walls and the tiling. We spent hours trying to get plumb lines through, trying to get things sort of lined - up! 'It actually looks like some of the windows are falling out, because of the way they had to be installed...because of the crookedness...'

The conversion work was undoubtedly extensive! consisting of completely removing and replacing the first floor; insulating throughout. The barn was also future-proofed with an air source heating system, along with underfloor heating. Finally, the conversion was completed with new windows and doors at the end of May 2022, with Andrew and Jennifer moving in on 1st June that year.


